## ***EIA Forecasts Rising Oil Prices in 2021***

Demand for petroleum products declined this year in reaction to reduced economic activity due to the COVID-19 pandemic, but the future looks much better, according to a report from the Energy Information Administration (EIA) at the U.S. Department of Energy.

EIA predicts the U.S. gross domestic product (GDP), which began rising in the third quarter of this year, will grow by 3.1 percent annually in 2021 offsetting a 4.4 percent decline in the first half of 2020.

As economic activity rises, so will consumption.

EIA forecasts that global consumption of petroleum and liquid fuels will increase 5.6 million barrels per day (b/d) in 2021 from an average of 92.4 million b/d for all of 2020, which is down by 8.8 million b/d from 2019.

On the supply side, EIA forecasts OPEC crude oil production will average 27.5 million barrels b/d in 2021, up from an estimated 25.6 million b/d in 2020.

The increase reflects OPEC's announced potential increases to production targets and production increases in Libya. At the December 3 meeting, OPEC and OPEC+ participants decided to limit oil production increases planned for January 2021. OPEC+ announced it will increase its production target by 0.5 million b/d in January 2021. The group had initially planned to increase its target by 2.0 million b/d. The group will also assess the state of global oil markets and petroleum demand monthly, adjusting targets based on market conditions.

EIA now forecasts OPEC crude oil production will average 25.7 million b/d in the first quarter of 2021, which is 1.7 million b/d lower than forecast in November and reflects the announced changes to OPEC+ targets and more effective assumed compliance with targets.

EIA expects crude oil production in the U.S. Lower 48 states will increase from 8.7 million b/d in February 2021 to 9.1 million b/d in December 2021, as drilling increases in response to rising oil prices. This increase contributes to total U.S. crude oil production reaching 11.4 million b/d in December 2021. On an annual average basis, EIA expects U.S. crude oil production to fall from 12.2 million b/d in 2019 to 11.3 million b/d in 2020 and 11.1 million b/d in 2021.

Crude oil prices responded to increases in demand and lower supplies by rising to the \$40-\$45 range on the New York Mercantile Exchange in early December and \$45-\$48 range on the international Brent crude oil exchange.

EIA expects that Brent prices will average \$49 in 2021, up from an expected average of \$43 in the fourth quarter of 2020.

Crude oil prices in the U.S. began the year at \$60 but fell sharply in April reaching a historic low of -\$37 per barrel in response to the pandemic creating a lockdown of economic activity and a record oversupply of crude oil in storage.

Today, economists are optimistic about the return of economic activity worldwide as the medical community begins the distribution of vaccines for COVID-19.

## Oil prices show strength

Crude oil prices took an unexpected leap last week on the announcement by Saudi Arabia that it was going to reduce oil production by an additional 1 million barrels per day (b/d) during February and March. Oil prices for West Texas Intermediate surpassed the \$50 per barrel threshold for the first time since the Covid-19 pandemic began last year. Oil opened at \$50.74 on NYMEX, and \$54.38 on the international Brent market on Thursday.

The Energy Information Administration reported Thursday a decline of 8 million barrels of crude oil inventories to 485 million barrels, indicating a further decline in the oversupply of oil in the U.S. Inventories peaked on June 19 at 540 million barrels, but it has been dropping slowly since then.

Refinery runs were down 15% in 2020 because of weaker demand due to the decline in economic activity.

The news of a possible reduction in oil supplies gave new life to investors as stock prices for oil companies rose. Texas Energy Report stated Thursday stocks of all 20 companies it tracks daily increased, except one.

Investors were surprised earlier in the week when Saudi Energy Minister Prince Abdulaziz bin Salman announced Saudi Arabia would cut its oil production by 1 million barrels per day (b/d). Earlier in the week, the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC), and some of its non-members who have agreed to production cuts previously, said it would continue its agreement to cut production 9.7 million b/d, except for Russia and Kazakhstan who were permitted to add a combined 75,000 b/d.

“It was a calculated move from an oil superpower that had previously warned speculators to watch their backs,” according to a report from Bloomberg, which quoted Prince Abdulaziz as saying Saudi Arabia has the “responsibility of looking after the market.”

The agreement momentarily solidifies a fragile relationship between Saudi Arabia and Russia, the two largest producing countries outside the U.S. Saudi leaders believe in reducing sales volume in

exchange for better oil prices. However, Russia wants to produce more to maintain market share and prevent the higher cost production in the U.S. off the market.

Obviously, demand for crude oil has declined since the pandemic hit a year ago. Oil prices dropped from \$60 in January to \$15 in April, which witnessed prices falling into negative territory of -\$37 on April 20 on NYMEX. Prices recovered slowly as the oversupply dwindled because of production cuts and demand slowly returning.

In other news, EIA reported no oil imports from Saudi Arabia into the U.S. last week for the first time since September 1985. Bloomberg said the absence of deliveries follows a slump in crude shipments to the U.S. that left Saudi Arabia in October, and it takes about six weeks for oil tankers to reach U.S. ports from the Middle East.

Oil imports have declined steadily from Saudi Arabia and other countries in the Middle East over the years. Imports from Saudi Arabia peaked in December 2000 at 58 million barrels, according to EIA data.

Canada is the largest oil exporter to the U.S. at 122 million barrels in October, which is about half of all U.S. imports of 228 million barrels, according to EIA.

## [President Biden issues executive orders first day in office](#)

There is a new game in town with new players, new regulators, and even a new set of rules.

Joe Biden became the 46<sup>th</sup> President of the United States this week and immediately issued more than a dozen executive orders. Executive orders are one tool President Biden will have at his disposal to implement his policies or reverse actions of a previous President.

In one of his executive orders, Biden directed federal agencies to review and possibly revise more than 100 changes to regulations implemented by the Trump administration.

Obviously, the regulatory process will be important. Biden has appointed a seasoned team who will quickly begin proposing and implementing changes impacting the operation and business practices of the oil and gas industry. Federal regulatory agencies – such as the Environmental Protection Agency, Interior Department and Department of Energy – have direct impact over energy operations. Other agencies – Treasury, Securities and Exchange Commission and Justice – have authority to implement, change and/or reinterpret current and future laws and regulations. These agencies will play a key role in carrying out the policies of the Biden administration.

Another executive order issued this week will cancel the permit for the Keystone XL crude oil pipeline, which has been under construction for 12 years at a cost of \$9 billion. It has been delayed several times by environmental groups. Once completed, it would have stretched some 1,200 miles from Alberta, Canada to Nebraska transporting an estimated 830,000 barrels per day of oil sands.

Canada, the largest exporter of oil to the U.S., wanted the pipeline completed so it could transport an oversupply of underpriced heavy crude oil to markets in the U.S. to be refined and distributed to consumers.

The pipeline has been controversial from the very beginning.

Environmental groups said the Canadian crude oil would add to air emissions, and it should be prohibited.

Another executive order renews participation of the [U.S. in](#) the Paris Climate Accord.

President Biden will take advantage of the change in the Senate - 50 Republicans and 50 Democrats (actually there are 48 Democrats but two senators are technically "independents" but organize with the Democrats) - and a Democrat majority in the House to push for quick action, especially within his first 100-days in office, on a variety of energy and climate change issues.

Biden served as Vice President under President Obama when Democrats almost succeeded in passing a cap-and-trade bill that would have implemented new restrictions on fossil fuels. While a cap-and-trade scheme has lost its pizzazz among lawmakers in Washington, a carbon tax has gained popularity even among some business groups, including large integrated oil companies such as ExxonMobil and BP.

Biden will be looking for new sources of revenue to finance his \$1.9 trillion spending proposal aimed at accelerating the distribution of coronavirus vaccines and build a net-zero emissions economy.

*Helpful information for those having to use oxygen or breathing treatments due to bronchitis, Pneumonia or COVID19 submitted by Lanette Mills*

With all that has gone on this past year & the uprising of bronchitis & pneumonia issues as well as Covid19, thought I'd put a two cent note in this Jet Jotter for people who may end up on oxygen or having breathing treatments due to any of the three mentioned, COPD (Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease), or other lung diseases. Most people go home & do the 1 to 3 treatments a day just like the doctor (or more often the nurse) explains to do the ritual. Make sure your hands are washed & your equipment is cleaned or rinsed out thoroughly with hot water. Keep your medications in the proper temperature, weather it is room temp or in the refrigerator at colder degrees. Open the med packet and empty the medication in the cup as

required and make sure your top & middle sections are placed properly above and securely closed. Get your tubing and connect one end tightly & securely on the receiving end of the nebulizer. Please don't forget to plug it in. Place the other tubing end into the side stream hand held or mask options that you choose to use. Once you start, make sure you breathe in as much as possible with your mouth a blow out through your nose. Once you finish the 10 to 12 minutes cycle, undue all that you have attached & clean well again with warm water & bleach & hang to air dry. DO NOT put in baggies, this can cause molding. UGH! OK, let's back up ONE step, Before cleaning all items, have the person taking the treatment lean forward, cup your hand and carefully pound on the patients back from the top of the buttock area on one side on up to the shoulder area. Do the same on both sides of the back. The area of the lung/ribs under the arm pits should be paid close attention to as well. Pound/tap this area to help loosen the phlegm in the lungs. If the person has COPD, a hard time coughing, or too weak to cough to expel their mucus this last, less known maneuver can be of a big help. If it is a small or fragile person or you are afraid you will "hit" too hard, you can place a towel between the back & your hand.

Getting the mucus from the lungs is the main reason the breathing treatments are being used. So help the patient as much as you can to help with this terrible situation we have found ourselves in

I joined the Desk and Derrick Club of Graham in 1984. A lady employed at a local supply shop invited me to go to a meeting with her and hesitantly, I agreed to go. I have always been a very quiet person and it made me a nervous wreck just having to stand and introduce myself. I was totally intimidated by the women at the meeting and I really didn't intend to go back. A week or so after that meeting, a long time D&D member was in our office for other business. Before leaving, she stopped by my desk and commented on my attending the meeting and strongly encouraged me to attend the next meeting. I decided to give it another chance and that next meeting just happened to be the orientation meeting and of course, it was one of those infamous Speak Easy skits. I saw another side of the women that were so intimidating to me. They were still professional and confident women but they were also fun-loving women that knew how to laugh at themselves. I was so impressed by that. After attending the second meeting, I received a card in the mail inviting me to join the club. I chose to join but promised to NEVER be in one of those skits! That was a promise I didn't keep...I've probably been in at least twenty skits through the years.

I was placed on a committee and almost immediately began getting acquainted with other members. I attended field trips, my first was to Glen Rose and Granbury where we spent the day learning about the energy industry but also just spending fun time together. The Finance Committee had fundraising events on the downtown square and by participating in the event, I realized the difficulty in funding the club's budget. With each event attended, we were building relationships through working together. I was participating and becoming involved in D&D, and I was enjoying it. The Employer Appreciation Banquet in October was a special event and I was amazed by so many members (on different committees) working together to honor our industry leaders and our community in such a professional and entertaining manner.

In just a few months I had learned so much from being active and involved in Desk & Derrick. Participation and involvement are crucial! You only benefit from being a member if you are involved. Being involved builds relationships but equally important, it builds self-confidence and self-confidence improves every aspect of our lives, including our communication and social skills and specifically our employment skills. These were some of the very reasons this organization was founded.

I took the idea to our president and our parliamentarian and after lots of protocol detail, our club voted to collectively host our first annual Desk and Derrick Club of Graham Golf Tournament. It took months of planning and organizing the



tournament and every member was involved in some way. Our employers and even our community supported our tournament. It was a huge challenge but together, we made it a huge success! At the year's end, we had covered our budget and had over \$7K remaining to start the scholarship program.

Being involved in the golf tournament gave me the confidence to accept more challenges. In the fall, I again agreed to be a candidate to serve on the local board of directors and was elected to serve as Treasurer on the 1990 Board of Directors. In 1993 and again in 2004, I had the honor of serving as President of the Desk and Derrick Club of Graham,

If you like to travel, the regional and associational meetings are THE BEST!! I attended my first convention in 1985 in San Francisco. I believe my first region meeting was in 1987. Over the next 30 years, I seldom missed a meeting that was out of town. The seminars were so informative and motivating and the field trips were simply amazing because through Desk and Derrick, we had access to places that an individual would never see. I made some wonderful friends all over the USA and Canada and realized the diverse opportunities of the organization.

In February of 1998 our club hosted a motivational seminar at the Graham Woman's Club. We recruited five accomplished Desk and Derrick ladies as the speakers and invited the surrounding clubs in Region IV and Region V. That day, the speakers encouraged me to submit my name as a candidate for region director and in the spring, I was elected to serve as the 1999 Region IV Director. It was the support and love of my friends standing with me and sharing in the experience...and I am forever grateful and humbled by the honor.
