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Crude oil and gasoline prices rise as demand increases

Crude oil and gasoline prices have rebounded from lows recorded in mid-2020 created by an economic recession amidst the global Covid-19 pandemic.

Oil prices on the New York Mercantile Exchange have risen from \$16 per barrel in April 2020 to reach \$65 this week, and they have increased 38% from \$47.62 on Jan. 1.

U.S. gasoline prices have followed rising from \$2.336 on Jan. 1 to \$2.857 (22.3%) on March 8, according to the Energy Information Administration (EIA).

AAA reported the average price for regular gasoline in Texas was \$2.531 on March 8. The average price in North Texas and West Central Texas was a little higher with both posting an average of \$2.599, but East Texas was \$2.533, which is more in line with the statewide average.

Crude oil prices suffered throughout 2020. Demand for petroleum product plummeted as economic activity collapsed. An oversupply of oil existed worldwide.

Members of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) and some non-members, such as Russia, agreed to cut their oil production in an effort to bring supply more in line with demand and to firm price.

OPEC met again last week and extended the cuts through April, which will result in an estimated 7 million barrels per day (7%) of reductions from the global market.

Even though U.S. crude oil production peaked at 12.8 million barrels per day (b/d) in January 2020, production averaged 11.3 million barrels per day (b/d) in 2020, down 935,000 b/d (8%) from the record annual average high of 12.2 million b/d in 2019, according to EIA data. The 2020 decrease in production was the largest annual decline in the U.S., EIA stated.

Low oil prices and a collapse in drilling resulted in the production decline.

The declining prices led crude oil operators to shut in wells and limit the number of wells brought online, lowering the output for the major oil-producing regions, EIA stated.

In 2020, more crude oil was produced in Texas than in any other state, accounting for 43% of the national total. Crude oil production in Texas averaged 4.87 million b/d in 2020, a decrease of 205,000 b/d (4%) from the record high of 5.07 million b/d set in 2019.

The Federal Offshore Gulf of Mexico saw the largest decrease in crude oil production, falling by 245,000 b/d (13%) to an annual average of 1.65 million b/d in 2020. Several hurricanes and tropical storms struck the Gulf of Mexico last year, causing operators to evacuate platforms and shut in production.

North Dakota had the second-largest decrease at 242,000 b/d (17%) to an annual average of 1.18 million b/d.

Oklahoma had the largest percentage decrease at 19%, falling to an annual average of 469,000 b/d.

The largest statewide increase in crude oil production in 2020 was in New Mexico, where it increased by 133,000 b/d (15%) to a record annual average high of 1.04 million b/d. The growth in New Mexico came from the Permian Basin, which spans parts of western Texas and eastern New Mexico.

Petroleum industry faces supply and demand uncertainties

The risks involved in the oil and natural gas business have been well chronicled in many books, including Ruth Sheldon Knowles's *The Greatest Gamblers* and Daniel Yergin's *The Prize*.

But the risks, uncertainties, and volatility in today's oil and gas industry seem to be larger than ever.

Undoubtedly, the risks of finding oil and gas with a drill bit remain. However, technology has reduced those risks somewhat, but the new technology in drilling and production is more expensive.

Companies in the petroleum industry today face anti-industry advocates protesting the construction of everything from refineries to pipelines to daily production activities, such as hydraulic fracturing. Governments' reaction to climate change, global warming, Covid-19 affects the industry's ability to function as commodity prices swing up and down.

Within the last 12 months, crude oil and natural gas prices have dipped as low as -\$37 per barrel for oil and -\$0.05 per thousand cubic feet (Mcf) for natural gas. Oil prices have recovered to \$62 as demand has increased. Natural gas prices peaked during the unusually cold weather in Texas in February to more than \$100 per Mcf briefly, but settled in the \$2.70 range this week.

Crude oil and natural gas are both bought and sold at hundreds of locations around the world. Supply and demand play key roles. Many government agencies are assigned the duty to track and report on current activities and even forecast what the price might be in the future based on their assumptions about supply and demand.

One such agency in the U.S. is the Energy Information Administration (EIA), which released its Short-Term Energy Outlook this week.

EIA expects Brent crude oil prices will average \$64 per barrel (b) in the second quarter of 2021 and then fall to less than \$60/b through the end of 2022. Brent is a type of oil traded on an international exchange. It usually trades \$3-\$4 higher than oil traded on the New York Mercantile Exchange.

"Higher crude oil prices in March and April are primarily a result of lower crude oil production from members of the Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) and partner countries (OPEC+), as announced at their March 4 meeting," EIA stated.

"In February 2021, OPEC+ cuts, combined with supply disruptions in the United States, contributed to monthly global petroleum inventory withdrawals that EIA estimates totaled 3.7 million b/d, the largest monthly withdrawal since December 2002," EIA reported.

The Brent crude oil futures price averaged \$63 in early March leading up to the OPEC+ meeting, and the OPEC+ announcement put further upward pressure on crude oil prices and surpassed \$70 briefly before retreating into the mid \$60s.

EIA said its forecast "has several key uncertainties."

The first unknown impacting EIA's forecast is the speed of actual demand recovery, based on COVID-19 vaccination rates and the degree to which travel and employment conditions return to pre-COVID norms.

Another uncertainty on the supply side involves the degree to which OPEC+ production cuts will continue after April. Increases in crude oil prices will encourage OPEC+ participants to agree to production increases in later meetings or to relax compliance with the existing agreement, EIA said.

"Finally, the responsiveness of U.S. tight oil production to higher oil prices is also uncertain," EIA noted.

News of Covid-19 increase in Europe creates oil price decline

The petroleum industry in the U.S. encountered a variety of bad news recently as a resurgence of Covid-19 came to light in Europe, demand projections were reduced, oil prices slipped 6%, and talks in Washington included the possibility of a tax on carbon from fossil fuels.

Germany, France and Italy increased lockown measures in response to new outbreaks of Covid-19. Oil traders surmised that the lockdowns will decrease demand and quickly bid down oil prices from \$70 per barrel for Brent crude, which is traded on the international exchange, to \$62. Oil closed at \$60 on the New York Mercantile Exchange on March 24. Energy Information Administration (EIA) reported a 2-million-barrel increase in oil inventories up to 500 million barrels, which is the fifth consecutive week inventories have increased.

Bloomberg reported demand has not been as robust as predicted in Europe. "Weakness in physical markets has grown recently, which coupled with a resurgent coronavirus in some parts of the world, has dragged crude lower," Bloomberg said. "OPEC+, which is holding on to output cuts in an attempt to buoy prices, could remain cautious about any future supply increase when it meets next week if prices remain on the back foot."

The Federal Reserve Bank in Dallas, which serves Texas, Louisiana and New Mexico, reported the economy in each state suffered significant damage as did the U.S. economy.

"The nation lost 10 million jobs from February to December 2020, an annualized rate of decline of 7.8%," the report authored by Keighton Hines and Keith R. Phillips stated. In Texas, jobs in the oil and gas sector declined 29.7%, leisure and hospitality suffered a 16.9% loss. Total nonfarm job loss for Texas was 5.6%, according to the study.

The Baker Hughes active drilling rig count plunged to about one-third of March 2020 levels in the three-state region. The count in Texas was down 70.6%, the study stated.

"Collapsing oil prices accompanied job losses across the region, although Texas declined less than the nation – at least partly due to fewer Covid-19 cases and deaths per capita," the study stated.

Even though the oil and gas industry is coming out of one of the most devastating years on record, President Biden and people within his administration are focused on reducing emission and fossil fuels are the primary target.

Gina McCarthy, who served as Director of the Environmental Protection Agency under President Obama and who now serves as climate adviser under Biden, held a virtual meeting with representatives of ExxonMobil, Chevron, BP, Shell, ConocoPhillips and Devon Energy this week. According to the White House the executives promised to collaborate with the Biden Administration and support federal regulations limiting emissions of greenhouse gases, and voiced approval of the return of the U.S. to the Paris climate agreement.

Those attending the meeting also indicated their support for the implementation of a carbon tax or an emission-trading program. The American Petroleum Institute, which represents major oil companies, said it "wants to ensure that policy makers in Washington understand that we can achieve our shared goal for a low-carbon future while strengthening American energy leadership and supporting the nation's economic recovery."

Big Oil supports government price policy for carbon

Yes, it is true that the Biden administration will propose soon a tax increase on energy usage in the form of a carbon tax, and yes it is true that the integrated petroleum companies have agreed to support a carbon tax.

A week or so ago representatives of ExxonMobil, Chevron, BP, Shell and ConocoPhillips – along with the American Petroleum Institute (API) – met with Gina McCarthy, the environmental climate adviser to President Biden, and voiced their support of a plan to reduce carbon emissions.

Obviously, a carbon tax will increase the cost of energy to consumers, and increase the cost to energy producing companies. During the last session of Congress, three bills were introduced implementing a carbon tax. All three bills would tax carbon dioxide emissions, but at different levels with different annual tax increases. Each bill attempted to ease the pain to consumers by refunding tax revenue to low and middle class tax payers or pay for a payroll tax cut.

API issued a lengthy publication pointing out it believes legislation implementing a carbon tax should price carbon across all economic sectors while avoiding regulatory duplication, encourage carbon capture and storage, provide funds for research and development, and support low-carbon fuels including natural gas.

"API will engage policymakers so that the design of a potential approach would price carbon at the outset for all relevant GHG (greenhouse gas) emissions across the economy, from all relevant sectors and all emitters, accounting accurately for the benefits, costs and amounts of GHG emissions" API said. "Policies should support significant investments in innovation to develop technologies that lower the cost of GHG emissions abatement across the economy."

"With respect to transportation fuels, a government policy-imposed carbon price should be disclosed at the point of retail sale," API said.

The Texas Alliance of Energy Producers, which represents more than 2,000 smaller companies, questions the validity and motives of supporting a tax that will increase cost to American producers.

"The supposed need for the regulation of carbon stems from the economic concept of 'externalities,'" said Alliance Executive Vice President Karr Ingham, who is a petroleum economist and author of the Texas Petro Index, in the March issue of the Alliance's newsletter. "An externality is something that markets cannot account for in the typical pricing system framework. For example, the price of a particular good may reflect various market elements – supply and demand, cost of production, etc., but will not capture the cost of pollution created in its manufacture. Proponents of a carbon tax will claim it is necessary because the pricing of energy products does not take the externalities into account.

"However," Ingham continued, "dumping a market system in favor of a centralized governmental system means that economic power, once diffused across the spectrum of the entire economy and all of its participants, is now concentrated in the hands of a few political elites whose motivations can scarcely be trusted. Therefore, the bar for substituting government management for market mechanisms should be extraordinarily high. For me, that bar has not been met."

Energy demand shows strength as economic activity rises

The reaction to the global pandemic, Covid-19, has turned the social, economic and political world up-side-down during the past year as governments implemented lockdown of businesses, prohibited travel, and even mandated "social distancing" and wearing of masks.

The creation and distribution of vaccines since the last few months of 2020 has relieved some of the restrictions and enhanced economic activity.

The Energy Information Administration (EIA) at the U.S. Department of Energy released its Short-Term Energy Outlook (STEO) this week forecasting U.S. gross domestic product (GDP) will grow by 5.6% in 2021 reversing a decline of 3.5% last year.

A positive change in economic activity will result in an increase in demand for energy.

EIA estimates world consumption of oil increased 4.7 million barrels per day (b/d) in March to 96.0 million b/d compared to March 2020, the beginning of the economic decline. EIA increased its oil demand projections from its last release stating global oil demand will rise an average of 5.5 million b/d this year over 2020 to 97.7 million b/d.

On the supply side, EIA expects crude oil production by OPEC will rise from an average of 25.1 million b/d in the first quarter (January to March) of 2021 to 25.8 million b/d in the second quarter (April to June) and to about 27.9 million b/d in the second half of 2021. EIA estimates U.S. oil production will increase from 11.1 million b/d in January to 11.4 million b/d in the fourth quarter. U.S. oil production peaked a year ago at 13 million b/d.

"The forecast of rising U.S. crude oil production is the result of our expectation that West Texas Intermediate (WTI) crude oil prices will remain above \$55 per barrel through the forecast period," EIA stated.

EIA forecasts oil prices for Brent crude oil on the international exchange will average \$61-\$65 this year. Brent crude usually trades \$3-\$4 higher than WTI on the New York Mercantile Exchange.

EIA expects gasoline consumption will increase as restrictions are removed and oil prices rise. "For the 2021 summer driving season (April to September), the EIA forecasts U.S. regular gasoline retail prices will average \$2.78 per gallon, up from an average of \$2.07 last summer."

Natural gas consumption will average 82.9 billion cubic feet per day (Bcf/d) this year down 0.4% from 2020, EIA stated. Natural gas prices at Henry Hub averaged \$2.62 in March which is down from \$5.35 in February when demand peaked during a very cold winter storm. EIA forecast Henry Hub spot prices will average \$3.04 for all of 2021.

Natural gas will be the largest fuel used to generate electricity with an estimated 36% market share this year. EIA expects wind and solar to continue growth and increase market share as electricity consumption increases by 2.1% in 2021 after falling 3.8% in 2020.

EIA estimated carbon dioxide (CO2) emissions decreased by 11% in 2020, but forecasts a 5% increase this year because of increased economic activity and energy use.



April 14, 1865—Dramatic Oil Company's failed Oilman becomes Assassin

After failing to make his fortune in Pennsylvania oilfields, John Wilkes Booth assassinated President Abraham Lincoln in Washington, D.C.. Just one year earlier Booth had left his acting career to drill an oil well in booming Venango County.

In January 1864, Booth visited Franklin, Pennsylvania, where he leased 3.5 acres on a farm along the Allegheny River. With several partners, including friends from the stage, Booth formed the Dramatic Oil Company.

Although the Dramatic Oil Company's well produced about 25 barrels of oil a day, Booth and his partners wanted more and tried "shooting" the well to increase production. When the well was ruined, he left the Pennsylvania oil region in July 1864.

April 19, 1892—First U.S. Gasoline Powered Auto

American inventors Charles and Frank Duryea on April 19, 1892, test drove a gasoline powered automobile built in their Springfield, Massachusetts, workshop. Considered the first automobile regularly made for sale in the United Sates, the model would be produced—a total of 13—by the Duryea Motor Company. Other manufacturers soon followed the Duryea example.

April 7, 1902—Texas Company founded during Spindletop Boom

Of the hundreds of oil companies founded during the Spindletop drilling boom at the beginning of the 20th century, the Texas Company would grow into a petroleum industry giant.

On April 7, 1902, Joseph "Buckskin Joe" Cullinan and Arnold Schlaet formed the company in Beaumont to transport and refine oil from the booming oilfield. They constructed a kerosene refinery in Port Arthur. A January 1903 oil discovery—the Fee No. 3 well at nearby Sour Lakes Springs—would erupt and being producing 5,000 barrels of oil a day, launching the company's success in exploration and production operations.


The telegraph address of the Texas Company's New York office was "Texaco" - a name soon applied to its products. In 1909 the company registered its first trademark, a red star with a green capital letter "T" superimposed on it. By 1928 the company had more than 4,000 gasoline stations in 48 states. The Texaco Company officially renamed itself Texaco Inc, in 1959.

April 7, 1966—Cold War Accident boosts Offshore Technology

A robotic technology soon adopted by the offshore petroleum industry was the first used to retrieve an atomic bomb. America's first cable controlled underwater research vehicle (CURV)

attached cables to recover the weapon lost in the Mediterranean Sea.

The 70-kiloton hydrogen bomb, which was lost when a B-52 crashed off the coast of Spain in January, was safely hoisted from a depth of 2,850 feet. "It was located and fished up by the most fabulous array of underwater machines ever assembled," proclaimed a *Popular Science* magazine article. During the Cold War, the Navy developed deep-sea technologies that the offshore petroleum industry would adopt and continue to advance.

April 2, 1978—First Episode of "Dallas" airs on CBS

Marketed as a prime-time soap opera, "Dallas" debuted as a miniseries on the CBS network. The show featured the Ewing family and the independent oil company, Ewing Oil. The U.S. petroleum industry's image would suffer for 14 seasons. J.R.'s shady business schemes and "unapologetic commitment to self-interest" attracted loyal viewers, noted show creator David Jacobs in a 1990 New York Times article. The cliffhanger. "Who shot J.R.?" mystery, the show's third-season finale, led to the "Who Done It?" episode, which at the time was the highest-rated television episode in U.S. history, watched by 83 million people.



April 20, 2010-Deepwater Horizon Disaster

At 10 a.m., while completing a well in the Macondo Prospect 50 miles off the Louisiana coast, the *Deepwater Horizon* exploded and sank, killing 11 people and injuring 17. An estimated 3.2

million barrels of oil flowed in the Gulf of Mexico after the platform's 400-ton blowout preventer failed.

At another site six months earlier, the semisubmersible rig had set a record for drilling the deepest offshore well (35,050 feet vertical depth in 4,130 feet of water). The Macondo Prospect well, finally capped in mid-July, was investigated by the Minerals Management Service and U.S. Coast Guard.


