

Our April speaker was Rebecca "Becca" Haberman with H.E.A.R.T.

H.E.A.R.T. works with Veterans and First Responders, active & retired, who deal with the private daily battle of Anxiety, Depression & PTSD. H.E.A.R.T was founded 6 years ago to meet a much needed gap in the mental health resources available to veterans and First Responders.

Becca shared her personal background, the purpose of the organization, and offerings with all in attendance at the April Club Meeting. While some parts were more difficult to hear then others, it was none the less important for us to all hear about this resource in our community.

H.E.A.R.T's purpose is to help through education and peer to peer support, and offer a safe space for those who have been through PTSD to share their stories openly. H.E.A.R.T has communicated with over 500 people and conducted over 50 PTSD awareness presentations and seminars and has had no suicides during their help in the past 6 years.

H.E.A.R.T offer the following programs:



REBOOT Combat Recovery specifically addresses military trauma. Veterans or active duty service members of all eras are welcome to attend. Spouses and caregivers also benefit greatly and are encouraged to participate. No cost to Veteran. Graduation Ceremony and t-shirt.

FIRST RESPONDERS

REBOOT First Responders specifically addresses duty-related trauma. All first responders (fire, EMS, law enforcement, corrections, 911 dispatch, hospital emergency staff and beyond) are encouraged to attend. Spouses and caregivers also benefit greatly and are encouraged to participate.



Equine un-mounted therapeutic support services provided by our partner , The HORSE Center. Classes take place every Wednesday at 6pm. Individual, group, or family sessions are available at no cost to participant.

HOW MUCH SOLAR PV IS NEEDED FOR NET ZERO TARGET?

To meet its 2050 net zero target, the United States needs to cover land 50 times the size of Austin, Texas, with solar PV, according to Rystad Energy.

The independent energy intelligence company estimates that the utility solar PV installed capacity required to meet the target would occupy around 13,412 square miles of land, which it says is equivalent to 0.43 percent of the total land area in the lower 48 states, or roughly 50 times the size of Austin. The operational utility solar PV capacity in the U.S. as of February 2021, according to Rystad Energy's RenewableCube, is about 48.8 gigawatts, which is said to cover 654 square miles of land.

Rystad noted that land scarcity is often cited as a key barrier to ramping up solar capacity in the United States. The company also warned that upgrading the current transmission network and building new lines would be crucial in order to deliver electricity from remote locations – where it says solar plants are generally located - to centers of demand with high population density and outlined that the intermittent nature of solar will require an "unprecedented" roll-out of storage infrastructure.

"Although building all these solar farms is no easy task, with the right choice of unoccupied land and with sufficient investments in infrastructure, it can be done," Felix Tan, a senior analyst at Rystad, said in a company statement.

"Not every state is a good fit for large-scale solar plants, but certain southern states could take on larger gigawatts-scale projects than others," he added.

"Bearing in mind that the Biden administration is also planning a major expansion of transmission networks across the country, the scene is set for gigawatt-scale solar PV projects to be launched. We expect more gigawatt-scale solar PV projects to follow, including hybrid developments," Tan went on to say.

The 600 megawatt Topaz solar farm in California, which came online in 2013 and 2014, currently ranks as the largest plant in the country.

I've worked for Colgate Energy for 5 years now and our little company is becoming a big company fast. It's been exciting to be a part of the growth and see the accomplishments over the years.





OVERVIEW

Wind energy is the process by which the wind generates mechanical power or electricity. People have been using energy from the wind for hundreds of years to pump water or grind grain. Today, wind turbines generate electricity. Wind power has a relatively high output, but only a fraction of its potential is currently used. Wind power plants cannot produce power on demand—their output depends on how hard the wind blows. Wind power often supplements other power sources. Wind power plants are also not feasible for all geographical locations. For example, very cold areas may not be ideal for wind power because of a small chance for ice thrown off the turbine blades.

Wind is a form of solar energy. The sun's radiation heats different parts of the Earth at different rates - most notably during the day and night - influenced by the shape of the planet's terrain, bodies of water, and vegetation. Hot air rises, reducing the atmospheric pressure at the Earth's surface, and cooler air draws in to replace it. The result is wind.

Wind energy does not produce harmful greenhouse gases or waste products. According to the American Wind Energy Association, wind reduces emissions. One modern turbine could prevent 1,500 tons of carbon dioxide from releasing into the atmosphere in the US each year.

WIND TURBINES NOISE CONCERNS

A common concern about wind power plants is noise: Do huge turbines make a lot of noise when they are spinning? While turbines do make noise, it is generally not loud enough to be disruptive to people's day-to-day activities. Earlier turbine models were much noisier than today's models, which have been redesigned to be more streamlined and efficient (and considerably quieter). The mechanical components of wind turbines do make some noise, but since the nearest houses are usually at least 300 meters/984 feet away, the noise that can be heard inside the houses would be comparable to that inside a quiet, air-conditioned office.

SHADOW FLICKER

Wind turbines' turning blades can cast a moving shadow on nearby buildings, called "shadow flicker." The American Wind Energy Association says wind power plant developers can calculate whether a flickering shadow will fall on a given location near a wind farm and how many hours in the year it will do so. This makes it possible for developers to build turbines in locations that will not cast a shadow on houses.

SOME ADDC FIRSTS

The first Club Meeting was held on March 1949 in New Orleans, Louisiana by Inez Awtry Shaeffer.

The first Articles of Association were signed on July 23, 1951.

In **1952** Inez Awtry Shaeffer was presented with an ADDC Honorary Member. There have only been two presented in ADDC history, the second being Lee Wilson Hoover in 1954.

The first ADDC President was Lee Wilson Hoover elected in 1952.

The first Convention was held in 1952 at the Shamrock Hotel in Houston, Texas. Forty clubs were represented with 994 registrants.

The first Oil and Gal Journal was published in **1952**. It was named by Josephine Nolen of Odessa, Texas, who won the contest for its name.

The first International Convention was in held September 1954 at the Banff Springs Hotel in Banff, Alberta, Canada.

The AIMEE (Achievement in Maintaining Energy Excellence) was first established in 1977. The two levels are the Regional Award of Merit (Region Winners) and the Association's Award of Excellence (International Winners).

The first Desk and Derrick Journal was published in **1987**. It replaced the Oil and Gal Journal.

Membership first opened to men in 1988.

In **2002** the curriculum was established for a Certification Program, the Petroleum Tech Certificate of Completion, to be given at the annual ADDC Convention.

In 2008, the first Petroleum Tech Certificate of Completion was awarded; there were seven people who received this certification.

The first ADDC Insight replaced the Desk and Derrick Journal in **2014**. Helen Trujillo, of the Club of Farmington, was the original editor. The Insight is a link between Club members and ADDC, and is only available online.

Membership first opened to people not employed with an energy industry business in **2015**.
