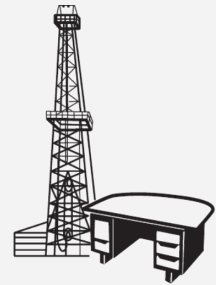

### Did You Know?

*Thomas Derrick was a hangman who lived in the Elizabethan Era, c. 1600. During his lifetime, he executed over 3,000 people using his modified version of the gallows. Oil derricks use a similar supporting framework as his original device, and hence were named after him. Derrick devised a beam with a topping lift and pulleys for his hangings, instead of the old-fashioned rope over the beam method. In English history, an executioner was not a commonly chosen career path because of the risk of friends and families of the deceased knowing who the executioner was and where to find him. Executioners were sometimes coerced into the role. Derrick in particular had been convicted of rape but was pardoned by the Earl of Essex (clearing him of the death penalty) on the condition that he become an executioner at Tyburn. In the end, Derrick had to execute his pardoner, the Earl of Essex, in 1601 for treason. (Interesting turn of events!)*

*Oil is the real black gold. It is a commodity that is so precious and sought after, that countries even go to war over it. It is an integral part of modern society, which is essential to keep the wheels of progress turning. Needless to say, the best instruments must be employed for the most efficient extraction of oil in order to keep up with demands. An oil derrick is one such instrument.*

Hello fellow Central Region Desk and Derrick Members!

Schools out and summer has begun with all the activities that make this an exciting time of year for families - vacations, Little League games, camps, family reunions, weddings, cookouts etc. Our local Liberal Club is taking a two-month meeting break in June and July, but will be refreshed and ready to start our meetings again in August. I know other clubs still have activities planned throughout the summer, and I would encourage you to post any upcoming events on our Central Region Facebook page, so that everyone is aware of your events, and could possibly attend.

This weekend I traveled to Colorado City for a family wedding, and my spirits were lifted to see all the traffic on the interstate. People are getting out and about as mask restrictions are being lifted, and the hope the pandemic is mostly behind us and a return to normalcy. So, if your area is easing up on the masks, be sure to replace it with a smile!

Big doors swing on small hinges. Deeds are not just what you do today, they have long-lasting effects. We have a new preacher at my church and he and his wife and family moved to Hooker from Slovakia. He shared with us, that had his father and mother not loaded up their possessions in a cattle trailer and moved to Perryton, Texas in the 70's, (his father was just beginning his career with Exxon at the time and later became a top Executive in the same company I worked for.) that he wouldn't have known this area if not for that small hinge that swung a big door.

Interesting concept which one can look back in our own lives and see how decisions we made on a certain day, have led us to where we are now. In getting ready to write this letter, it made me think of Inez Awty. What stirred in her mind in 1949 to start the Desk and Derrick organization? She saw a need for education, and made a difference! Oh, and what a difference it was! Big doors swing on small hinges. I found the following article by Cecilia Gutierrez Venable on the Texas State Historical Association.

***DESK AND DERRICK CLUBS.*** *The Desk and Derrick Club, the first organization for professional women in the oil and gas industry, was established in March 1949 by Inez Lord Awty of the Humble Oil and Refining Company in New Orleans, Louisiana. By 1951, four clubs had been established, including one in Houston which soon boasted 372 members. They united by signing articles of association and renamed themselves the Association of Desk and Derrick Clubs of North America (ADDC). Four years later the association included 101 clubs in the United States and four in Canada.*



*The state of Texas was divided into two regions (Region IV, East Texas, and Region V, West Texas), with every major city in Texas hosting a club. Total Texas membership had reached 2,038 in 1955. Through the years Texas has produced fourteen ADDC presidents. In 1969 a past president of the association, Irene Wischer (1954) from the San Antonio club, served as a member of President Richard Nixon's Citizens Advisory Council on the Status of Women.*

*The club's original purpose was to "promote among the women employed in the petroleum and allied industries through informative and educational programs, a clearer understanding of the industry which they serve." Each club held at least ten educational programs for its members. In March 1952 the association printed a club magazine called the Oil and Gal Journal. By 1957 the U.S. Patent Office granted the registration trademark of "Desk and Derrick," and the ADDC adopted the motto "Greater Knowledge—Greater Service."*

*In keeping with its educational goal, the association printed the Desk and Derrick Oil Abbreviator, a dictionary of commonly used terms in the oil industry and their shorthand connotations. The reference, which was conceived and compiled in 1967, was in its fifth edition and also available in a CD-ROM version in 2005. Other educational publications included Fundamentals of Petroleum, Land and Leasing, and Practical Petroleum Geology.*

*Each club held fundraisers for scholarships which were awarded to local students. In 1982 the association also established an educational trust for students seeking a degree in the field of petroleum and allied industries, and in 1987 the Association of Desk and Derrick Clubs Foundation was created to assist in developing industry-related educational projects. Male membership was allowed that same year.*

*In the late 1990s the association brought its educational efforts to grade schools with a videotape entitled Petro Molly and Her Magic Suitcase produced by the Bakersfield, California, Desk and Derrick Club. A Desk and Derrick member who dressed as the character in coveralls and hard hat and carried a suitcase with petrochemical products made presentations to Texas schoolchildren. In 2001 the association produced an activity book entitled Oil.*

*The association remains a viable organization in 2005. In that year the ADDC had sixty clubs, including sixteen in Texas, and the association president was from the Houston club. The Desk and Derrick Journal, formerly the Oil and Gal Journal, is published quarterly. Since 1956 ADDC has had its permanent distribution office in Tulsa, Oklahoma.*

A lot has in the 72 years of the existence of the Association of Desk and Derrick. We have gained and lost clubs, and we have reorganized into new regions. We have invited anyone who is interested in learning about the energy business to become members in our organization. We've been through the booms and the busts of the industry.

Even though we are down from the glory days of thousands of members, to 715 active members this year, we are surviving in a tough environment and circumstances, and yet we're still here, Big Doors swinging from the small hinge started in 1949 by Inez Awty.

### **What Makes an Effective Leader?**

While some believe leaders are born, there are others who would say leaders are made. In reality, effective leaders comprise of both. Everyone is born a leader but must embrace the molding it takes to become an effective leader. There are 10 keys to be an effective leader and we will explore each one.

- Passion
- Ethical Values
- Vision
- Creativity
- Intellectual Drive and Knowledge
- Confidence and Humility
- Communicator
- Planner/Organizer
- Interpersonal Skills
- Business Skills

**Passion-** A person must have passion for something greater than themselves. An instinct that drives a person to want to contribute in some way for the betterment of others.

**Ethical Values** - This one can be tricky and should be a no-brainer. However depending on the situation, you may encounter in life or business, it could lead a person to make wrong decisions. An effective leader will be held up to standards by others to make the right decisions and do so with respect. If a leader is not respectful to others, who do you think will follow? You cannot lead without respect and honesty.

**Vision** - Vision is based on two traits leaders need to possess: creativity and intellectual drive. It is different than passion but not inseparable. One will need to have ideas about change and viewing how the future can be different than what it is now.

**Creativity** - Think outside the box! One will need a sense of humor which will spark the creativity needed to create strategies to move forward the vision that needs to be accomplished.

**Intellectual Drive & Knowledge** - Leaders should be a student. To encompass the intellectual drive and knowledge to be an effective leader, one must be constantly learning and reading about the subject at hand and those they come in contact with.

**Confidence & Humility Combined** - You have great ideas, vision, and passion, but no confidence—the action will not take place. If there is no action, then there is no change. An effective leader has confidence, not only in oneself but also those around him/her. Sometimes

the great idea comes from someone else and an effective leader needs to have the humility to accept those ideas. A leader sees the big picture and focuses on the end result.

**Communicator** - The leader is also a great communicator who should be able to speak and correspond in a way to convince others to follow him/her. Leadership is about influence. Influencing others to do what you want them to do and make them feel like they are part of a team will accomplish the end project.

**Planner/Organizer** - An effective leader is also a team player by helping the team to plan and organize an idea or vision for a project to meet its deadline. A leader takes action to get things done through people.

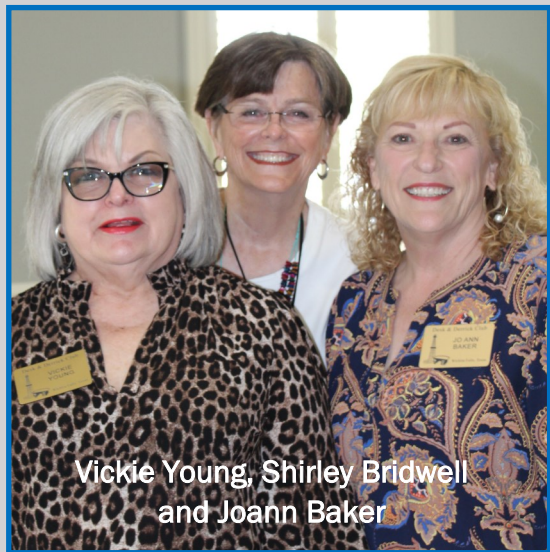

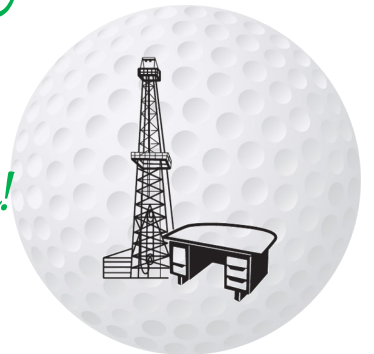

## Cyberattack on pipeline creates gasoline shortage

On Friday, Colonial Pipeline, which transports refined petroleum products (gasoline, jet fuel, etc.) from Texas to New Jersey, halted operations because of a cyberattack on its system. By Monday evening, service stations along the East Coast reported long lines and shortages of gasoline as people began to panic and topped off their vehicles.

Colonial Pipeline carries 2.5 million barrels per day (b/d) of petroleum products through a system of approximately 5,500 miles of pipeline.

“Because no refineries between Alabama and the mid-Atlantic produce substantial quantities of transportation fuels, the southeastern United States is supplied primarily by pipeline flows, and to a lesser degree, with marine shipments from the U.S. Gulf Coast and imports,” according to the Energy Information Administration.

Until Colonial Pipeline resumes operation, petroleum distribution terminals in the Southeast will rely on inventories and on supplies obtained from alternative sources, such as the smaller 720,000 b/d Plantation Pipeline that also carries petroleum products from the U.S. Gulf Coast to as far as Washington, DC, EIA stated.

Pipeline shipments move at approximately five miles per hour, so some markets may need to rely on inventories for several days after Colonial Pipeline service is restored, according to EIA.

Markets along the Atlantic Coast with access to deepwater ports, such as Savannah, Georgia; Charleston, South Carolina; Wilmington, North Carolina; and Norfolk, Virginia, can receive limited imports from the global market and from marine shipments via coastwise compliant shipping originating from the U.S. Gulf Coast. Central Atlantic and Northeast markets can import petroleum products from Europe and Canada, and they can also obtain supplies from in-region refineries.

Federal and state governments have issued regulatory waivers and notices to loosen restrictions on trucked shipments of petroleum products. The Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration issued waivers on driving time for truckers delivering refined petroleum products for 17 states and the District of Columbia.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation pointed the finger at a ransomware gang known as DarkSide. While cyberattacks are increasingly used around the world as a weapon against geopolitical rivals, there was no indication that the current crisis could boil over internationally.

## IEA says ‘no new oil and natural gas fields are needed’

The oil and natural gas industry in Texas and globally has for several years battled volatile prices, a coronavirus pandemic, declining demand, an oversupply of product, reductions of capital investments, and detrimental government policies in reaction to climate change.

The industry has been on a roller-coaster ride since the 1970s, but the recent issues began surfacing in 2015 when an oversupply of oil caused prices to decline sharply.

Then in January 2020 the Covid-19 pandemic surfaced and governments issued lockdowns and the global economy went into a tail spin. Demand for gasoline, diesel, jet fuel, crude oil and all forms of energy declined as did prices for petroleum products.

A year later Joe Biden took the oath of office to become President of the United States. Within days of taking office, Biden issued a series of Executive Orders designed to deter development of petroleum resources in the U.S. Within 100 days of taking office, he issued an extensive plan that would limit development of fossil fuels in the future.

Revenues and profits of the international oil companies plummeted. ExxonMobil, BP, Shell and Chevron all reported losses in 2020, and about \$900 billion worth of proven reserves were downgraded.

BP cut \$17.5 billion off the value of its assets, and ExxonMobil and Chevron announced a reduction of \$85 billion in capital expenditures.

Even though 2020 was a terrible year for the oil industry, the global economy and demand for petroleum improved with the development of vaccines for Covid-19. Prices stabilized in the \$60-per-barrel range making the short-term outlook more optimistic.

However, many governments world-wide believe that the use of fossil fuels needs to be reduced significantly if the goal of reducing greenhouse gas emissions can be achieved.

The International Energy Agency (IEA) issued a report this week stating “no new oil and natural gas fields are needed” if global warming is limited to a maximum increase of 1.5 degrees Celsius.



IEA is based in Paris, and it was established in 1974 following the oil crisis in 1973. Its membership includes 30 countries – such as countries of Western Europe, U.S., Canada, Mexico and Japan – but it does not include China and Russia. Initially, IEA focused on oil markets, including supply, demand and price. IEA's role has evolved and it has become more active in recommending policy to its member countries regarding climate change.

“The path to net zero emissions is narrow: staying on it requires immediate and massive deployment of all available clean and efficient energy technologies,” the IEA report stated.

“Achieving net-zero emissions by 2050 will require nothing short of the complete transformation of the global energy system,” IEA stated.

IEA sees oil consumption declining 75% to 24 million barrels per day (bpd) from roughly 100 million bpd in 2019. Natural gas consumption needs to decline by 55% and coal by 90%.

The 200-page report offers many different scenarios regarding the impact of these drastic changes, but it creates many questions about these new and unproven “clean and efficient energy technologies,” including what is defined as “clean and efficient?” Can these new sources of energy meet the increasing demands of consumers? What will be the cost? What are the consequences, intended and unintended?

## Gasoline prices rise as demand increases

Demand for petroleum products continues to expand into the Memorial Day holiday sending gasoline prices over the \$3-per-gallon mark for the first time in seven years.

AAA said the average retail price in the U.S. was \$3.03 on May 26 up from \$1.96 last year during the height of the economic slowdown caused by the coronavirus. The average price in Texas was \$2.732 this week compared to \$1.62 last year.

Crude oil, the main expense in gasoline, has increased to \$66 per barrel this week, which is up \$32 from a year ago. Crude oil inventories have been on a steady decline since June 2020 when inventories reached a record 540 million barrels. This week, inventories declined another 1 million barrels to 484 million, according to the Energy Information Administration (EIA).

AAA expects more than 37 million people to take trips this Memorial Day weekend, traveling 50 miles or more from home between May 27 and May 31. This total marks a 60% increase from 2020, when 23 million people traveled, the fewest since AAA began recording in 2000.

Although AAA expects substantially more travel this Memorial Day than in 2020, its estimate is still about 6 million fewer drivers than in 2019.

“In the week before Memorial Day 2020, gasoline demand was 7.0 million barrels per day (b/d), compared with an average of 9.5 million b/d for the same week for 2015–2019,” EIA reported. “The four-week average demand for gasoline increased 13% between the end of February 2021 and the end of April 2021. As of May 21, weekly demand of total motor gasoline was 9.5 million b/d, up 2.5 million b/d compared with the four-week average from the same time last year.”

Gasoline demand remains 37,000 b/d below the 2015–19 seasonal average, according to EIA

EIA said the increase in vaccinations and the gradual recovery in overall U.S. economic activity since the beginning of 2021 contributed to increasing gasoline demand going into the summer.



Refinery and pipeline disruptions in recent months have contributed to upward pressure on retail gasoline prices. The unexpected closure of Colonial Pipeline in early May further contributed to reductions in regional gasoline inventories along the East Coast, the largest U.S. gasoline market. Fuel shortages at retail stations and at terminals that normally rely on the pipeline increased regional gasoline prices while also preventing Gulf Coast refiners from increasing production to supply East Coast demand, EIA said.

A mixture of higher oil prices along with rising demand coupled with a reduction in supplies is a scenario for an increase in price.

## Crude oil prices show strength as economy recovers

The price of crude oil has made back all that it lost during the Covid-19 pandemic of 2020 as demand for petroleum products has returned.

In January 2020, crude oil traded in the \$60 range for West Texas Intermediate on the New York Mercantile Exchange (NYMEX), but began to slide as the global economy went into a tailspin because of governments' worldwide ordered lockdowns.

By the beginning of the second quarter the WTI price had fallen to less than \$20.

Soft prices resulted in production declines in the U.S. and around the world. U.S. production dropped from 13 million barrels per day (b/d) to 11 million b/d.

The Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries and a group of non-member producing countries, which includes Russia, decided to cut production by 9.7 million b/d.

As supply decreased and demand increased the oversupply eventually eased. Crude oil inventories in the U.S. reached a record high of 540 million barrels in June 2020, but they have declined to 484 million barrels, according to the Energy Information Administration.

Crude oil prices have increased. Oil on the NYMEX closed at \$68 per barrel on June 2 for 30-day delivery, and \$71 on the international exchange for Brent.

Bloomberg reports oil's underlying structure has firmed. The spread between the nearest two December contracts for WTI is heading for the strongest close since 2019, indicating expectations for market tightness.

Optimism about increased activity during this summer and continued reopening of the U.S. economy also indicates stronger demand.

Questions about supply remain, but OPEC agreed on June 1 to maintain the current pace of increasing oil supplies through July. OPEC began a policy in May to release an additional 2.1 million b/d.

Iranian nuclear negotiations pose issues about additions of supplies on the world market. If the U.S. and other nations reach an agreement with Iran, sanctions could be lifted and an additional 500,000 b/d could hit the market.

# this MONTH in petroleum history

## JUNE

### June 14, 1865—First Edition of Pennsylvania Oil Region Newspaper

Pennsylvania's oil region got its first daily newspaper when William and Henry Bloss published their four-page broadsheet, the Titusville Morning Herald. Initial circulation was 300 for the community newspaper, which is still published—the Titusville Herald.



A brief story in the first edition included a report about a failed-oilman-turned-assassin: *John Wilkes Booth purchased one-thirteenth interest in the territory in August 1864. We are credibly informed that this Homestead well in which booth was interested was destroyed by fire on the day he assassinated President Lincoln.*

### June 9, 1894—Water Well finds Oil in Corsicana, Texas

A contractor hired by the town of Corsicana to drill a water well on 12th Street found oil instead, launching the First Texas Oil Boom, seven years before a more famous discovery at Spindletop Hill, 230 miles southeast.

Although the 1894 oilfield discovery attracted thousands and brought prosperity to Corsicana, the city paid the contractor only half his \$1,000 fee since the agreement had been for drilling a water well.

Drilled with steam power and cable-tools, the well produced just 2.5 barrels of oil a day from 1,035 feet deep. It nevertheless brought a rush of exploration companies, and by 1898 there were about 300 oil wells around the town, which became a center for technological innovation.



Oil will transform Corsicana, Texas, from a small agricultural town to a petroleum and industrial center. Residents today annually celebrate their oil patch heritage with a "Derrick Days" festival.

One Corsicana service company began manufacturing its newly patented rotary drilling rig—which would be used at the 1901 "Lucas Gusher" at Spindletop. Corsicana today hosts an annual Derrick Days and Chili Cook-Off and is home to Wolf Brand Chili, established in 1895, thanks to the petroleum boom.

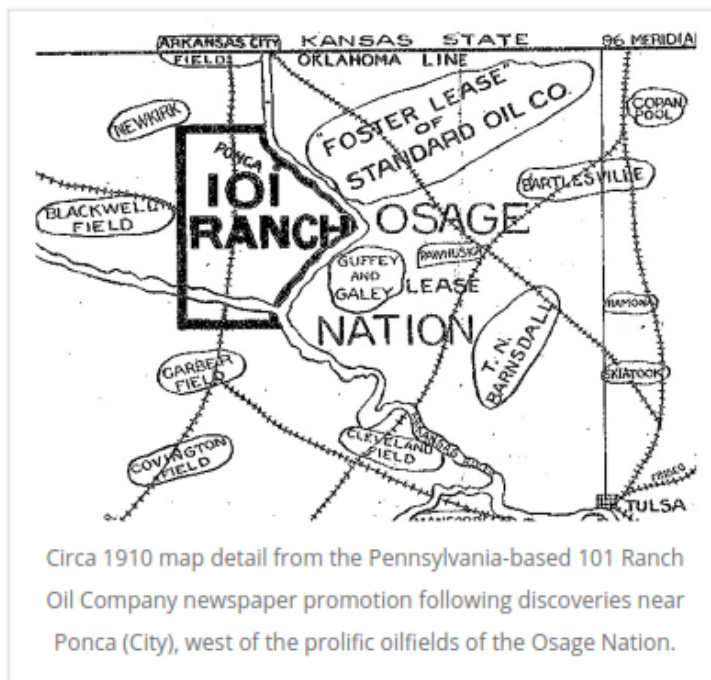


## June 11, 1911—First Ponca Nation Oilfield discovered by 101 Ranch Oil Company

Ernest W. Marland, founder of the 101 Ranch Oil Company in 1908, discovered an oilfield near Ponca City, Oklahoma, after reorganizing the company in his hometown of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Almost broke after drilling eight uneconomical wells, Marland had turned to his childhood friend John McCaskey of Pittsburgh, known as the “Sauerkraut King.”

Partnered with McCaskey and the Miller brothers, owners of the 101 Ranch, Marland received permission from White Eagle, chief of the Ponca Nation, to drill near a reservation burial ground, according to a 1974 biography, *Life and Death of an Oil Man: E.W. Marland*.

The discovery well and others that followed produced oil on a reservation allotment owned by Willie-Cries-For-War, age 19, who had leased his 160-acres to Marland for \$1,000 a year and 12.5 cents a barrel of oil produced. Marland would found Marland Oil Company in 1917, merge it with Continental Oil in 1928, and become Governor of Oklahoma in 1935. Conoco-Phillips opened a Conoco Museum in Ponca City in May 2007.



## June 13, 1917—Phillips Petroleum Company founded in Oklahoma

Phillips Petroleum Company was founded in Bartlesville, Oklahoma during the early months of America’s entry into World War I—when the price of oil climbed above \$1 per barrel.

Brothers Frank and L.E. (Lee Eldas) Phillips consolidated their companies and began operating with leases throughout Oklahoma and Kansas and assets of \$3 million. Assets grew to \$103 million by 1924. By 1927 Phillips Petroleum began selling gasoline in Wichita, Kansas, the first of more than 10,000 service stations across the country.

## June 6, 1944—Secret English Channel Operations fuel WWII Victory

The D-Day invasion began along 50 miles of fortified French coastline in Normandy. The logistics of supplying the beaches included two top-secret engineering triumphs: construction of artificial harbors followed by the laying of pipelines across the English Channel.

Code-named “Mulberrys” and using a design similar to today’s jack-up off-shore rigs, the artificial harbors used barges with retractable pylons to provide platforms to support floating causeways extending to the beaches.

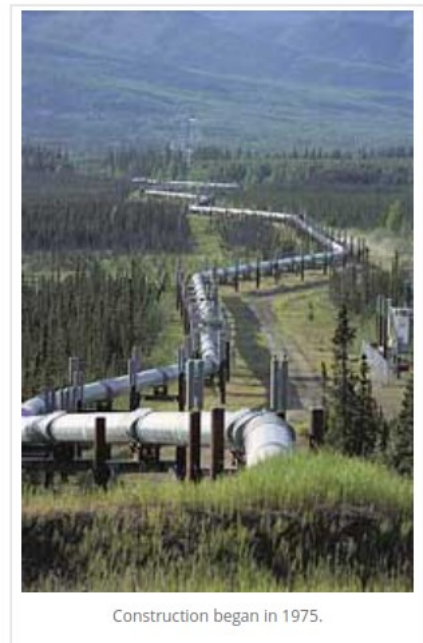
To fuel the Allied advance into Nazi Germany, Operation PLUTO (Pipe Line Under the Ocean) used flexible steel pipelines wound onto giant floating “Conundrums” designed to spool off when towed. Gen. Dwight Eisenhower later acknowledged the significance of the oil pipelines engineering feat.



## June 20, 1977—Oil begins Flowing in Trans-Alaska Pipeline

After three years of construction, the Trans-Alaska Pipeline began carrying oil 800 miles from Prudhoe Bay to the Port of Valdez at Prince William Sound.

The oil arrived 38 days later, culminating the world’s largest privately funded construction project at the time.

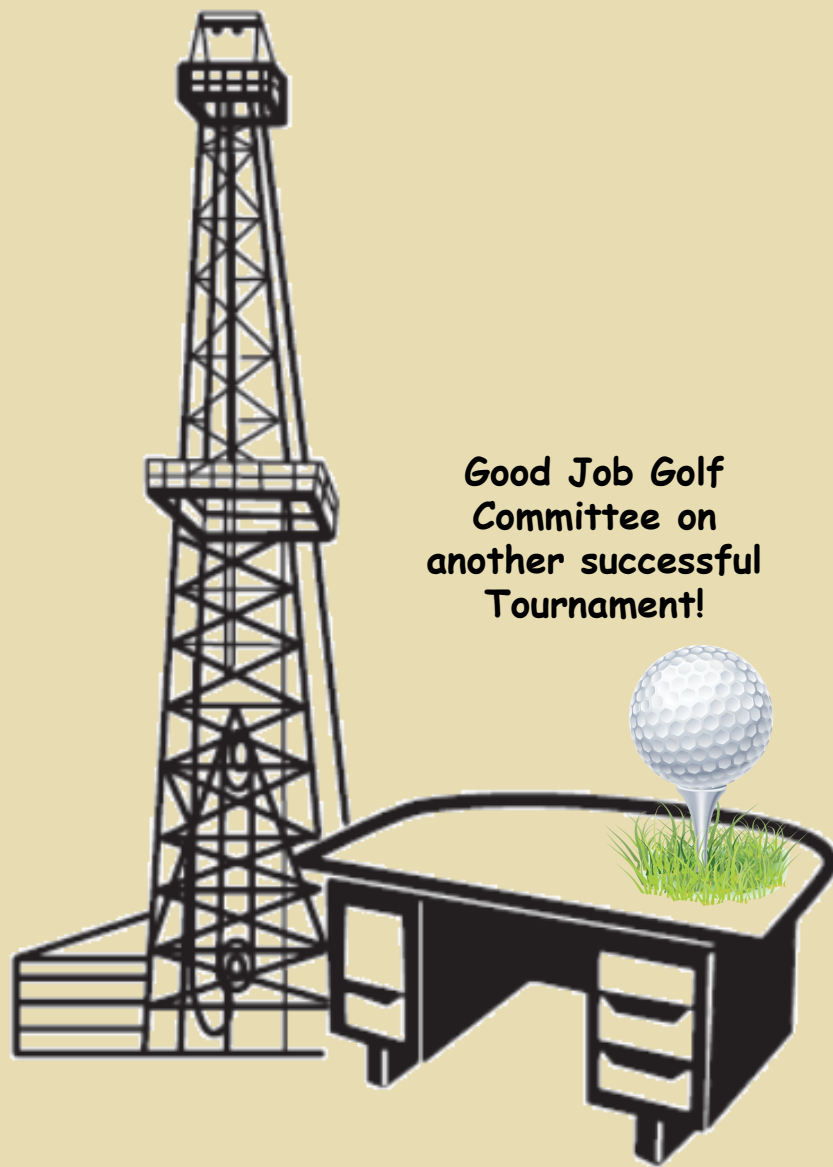
