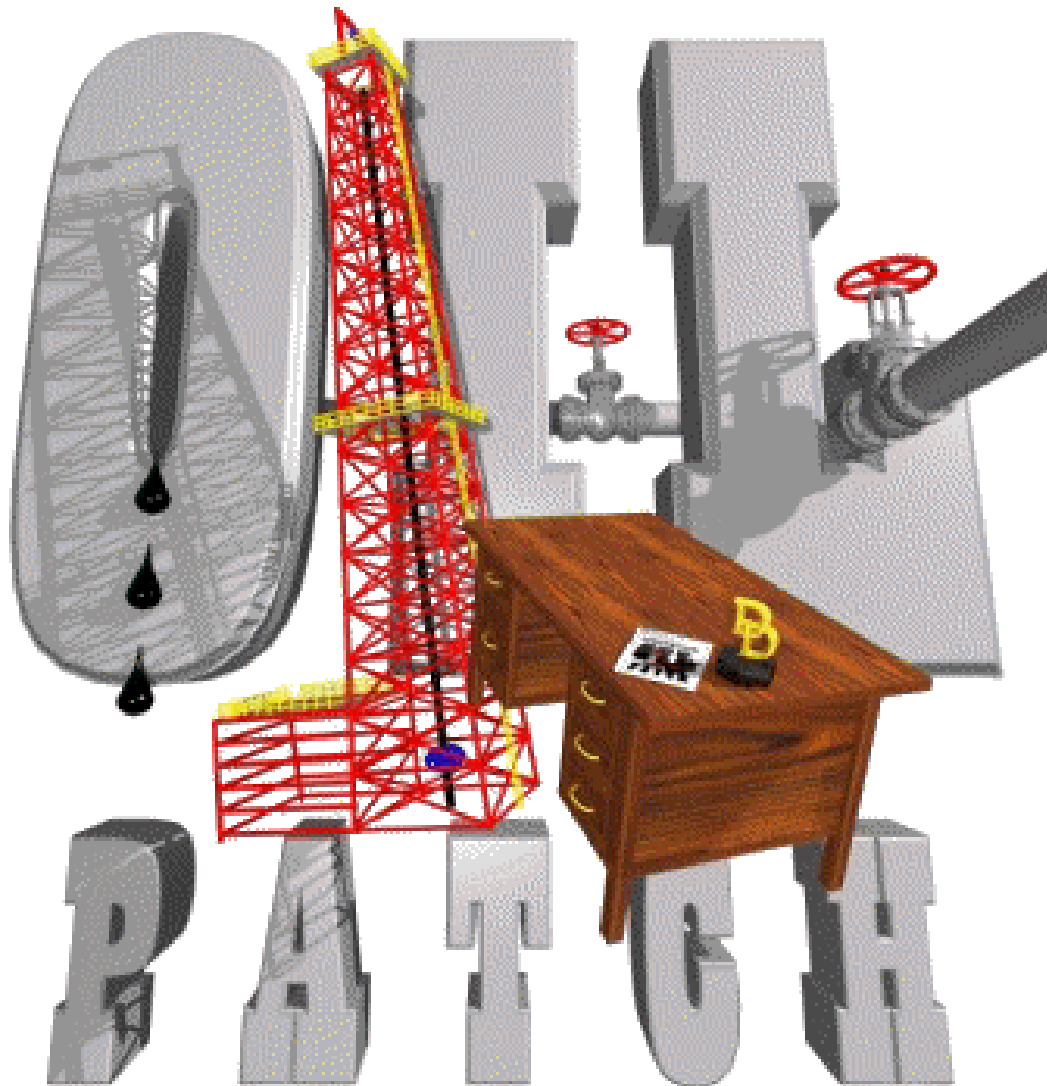

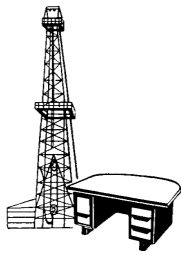

## **2021 Southeast Region Meeting Recap, Westbank Club President—Judi Adams**

The Red River Desk and Derrick Club held an in-person mini Southeast Region Meeting at the Shreveport Petroleum Club on May 22<sup>nd</sup>. I attended as Delegate; Susan Miller, 2020 Region Director, attended in person and Kerry LeMaire attended via Zoom. There were 16 members in Shreveport and at least 30 members attending via Zoom throughout the region.

Region Director Margie Steed called the meeting to order and presided over the opening procedures, with invocation, pledge of allegiance, and introductions.

The Registrar reported that 10 of the 11 Southeast Region clubs were in attendance; the delegate from Corpus Christi was not present.

The 2021 Southeast Region Nominating Committee presented the nominee for 2022 Southeast Region Director: Kathy Martin, Lafayette Club.

There being only one candidate, Margie Steed announced that Kathy Martin, Lafayette Club, was elected 2022 Region Director by acclamation. Kathy gave a motivational and encouraging speech. (She's going to be a great director, I do believe.)

The Lafayette Club members presented a video promoting Lafayette. Lafayette, per the meeting rotation schedule, will be the site of the 2022 Region Meeting. The meeting is scheduled to be held at the Doubletree Hotel, April 21-24, 2022.

Rather than read each club annual meeting update report, they were printed in the meeting program. The program was emailed to members on May 21; if you need it resent, let me know.

ADDC President Evelyn Green reported on the 2021 Convention and promoted it to the members.

Rules Committee Chairman, Judi Adams, reviewed the 2021 Proposed Amendments to ADDC Bylaws and Standing Rules. There was some discussion regarding the last Standing Rule but in general, there was support of the other proposed changes.



A brief memorial was given in remembrance of our members lost since the last region meeting. We remembered Deb McCuller, Red River; Linda Wilson, Lafayette; and Daisy Laporte and Pam Meldrum, New Orleans.

Region Fund Treasurer Susan Miller reported on the region's financial status. She also reported that club member counts are currently: Total 190; Baton Rouge—18; Corpus Christi—10; El Dorado—14; Lafayette—33; Morgan City—7; New Orleans—25; NHMC—8; Red River—20; San Antonio—10; Victoria—11; and Westbank—34.

Region Director Margie Steed gave a very strong, moving regional report (See page 16). We were also there to Celebrate Life, Margie also encouraged attendees (live and virtual) to wear their hats worthy of the Derby. The running of the roses was held as everyone wearing headwear had an opportunity to display it and explain their creation. Between Susan and me, we provided about 1/2 of the "hats" in the Red River meeting room. Susan brought several hats from Bonnie's trove of hats and fascinators. Everyone was asked to send their choices for a winner, who was announced on Monday after the meeting. Red River member Dorothy Semon won "the race" with her Driving Miss Daisy creation.

We adjourned with high hopes we'd be meeting in person in Lafayette next year!

The Red River Club treated us all to a very nice lunch at the Petroleum Club. They also sent us all "home" with freshly baked cookies. This wasn't like any region meeting any of us had experienced before, but it may be standard in the years ahead.

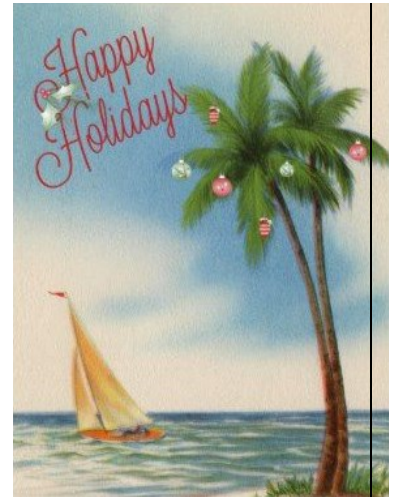
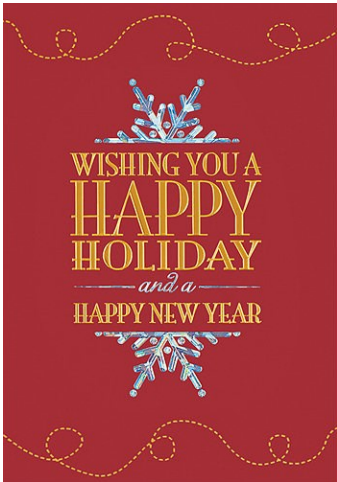

# Rig Additions In U.S. Top 100 For 2021

Baker Hughes reported on Friday that the number of oil and gas rigs in the United States increased by 2 this week, bringing the total rig count to 455—a more than 100-rig gain since the start of the year.

In the week prior, the U.S. oil and gas rig count increased by 5. But the longer trend in rig count additions bodes well for the U.S. oil industry, as drillers pick up the pace, adding 104 rigs so far this year, more than half of which were added in Texas.

The total number of active oil and gas drilling rigs in the U.S. is now 137 more than this time last year.

The oil rig count increased by 4 this week, bringing the total oil rig count to 356 this week. The number of gas rigs decreased by 1 to 99. The number of miscellaneous rigs fell by 1.

The EIA's estimate for oil production in the United States for the week ending May 14—the last available data—held steady this week at an average of 11 million barrels per day. The EIA estimates that U.S. oil production will reach a modest 11.04 million bpd this year, after falling from the 13.1 million bpd peak production reached in February 2020, before the pandemic crushed oil demand.

Canada's overall rig count also decreased this week by 1. Oil and gas rigs in Canada now sit at 58 active rigs, up 37 on the year.

The rig count in the Permian basin stayed the same this week. At 231 rigs, the Permian's total rig count is now 69 rigs above what it was this time last year, but hundreds below the two years ago level.

The Frac Spread Count provided by Primary Vision shows that fracking crews increased last week to 223. The frac spread count estimates the number of completion crews finishing off previously drilled wells. This frac count is up 90 so far this year, indicating that oil companies are both drilling and completing wells at a steady clip, while continuing to show cost discipline in the first quarter.

At 10:30 a.m. EDT, WTI was trading up \$1.51 per barrel on the day at \$65.08—down \$1.63 per barrel on the week.

The Brent benchmark was trading up \$1.26 per barrel on the day, at \$66.37 per barrel.

# Climate Revolt Against Big Oil May Lead to Surge in Crude Prices

The surge in climate activism demanding that Big Oil drastically cut emissions and shift strategies to investment in low-carbon energy instead of oil and gas could result in a surge in oil prices in the not-too-distant future. As much as environmentalists and activist shareholders want the major international oil firms to slash upstream investment further, the world's energy system is not ready yet to deprive itself of the oil and gas resources that Big Oil is exploring and developing. As it stands, 80 percent of global energy is still being met by fossil fuels, and net-zero emission targets or not, the global transition to low-carbon sources of energy will take decades, not just years, and a shareholder meeting or two.

Last week's rebuke of Big Oil's current strategic direction sets the stage for some unintended consequences that climate activists may have overlooked.

These consequences include unintentionally giving OPEC even more control over the global oil market. National oil companies—in countries where environmental policies are much weaker than in the U.S. and Europe where the oil supermajors are based—will be all-too-eager to step up and fill in the supply gap.

Then, significantly reduced investments in developing new resources—which are already low after the 2020 oil price collapse—could lead to a supply crunch down the road. This will, in turn, result in an oil price spike when oil supply struggles to catch up with demand.

Some would argue that oil demand would fall anyway, and the world wouldn't need as much supply as it did over the past decade. But there are currently no signs that oil demand is getting ready for a drastic fall, despite wishful thinking and net-zero scenarios, including the one from the International Energy Agency's (IEA) bombshell report that suggested no new investment in oil and gas needs to be approved beyond this year's commitments if the world is to reach net-zero emissions by 2050.

Investment in new oil will continue to be important, even if the world gets on the 2 degrees Celsius pathway. New low-cost, low-carbon barrels will be necessary in order to replace dwindling production from maturing fields, Wood Mackenzie analysts said last week. If these investments from international oil firms are insufficient, the national oil firms will step up to prove and commercialize new resources, WoodMac notes.

If Big Oil were to heed all the calls from environmentalists and the IEA's suggestion of 'no new oil and gas investment ever again', oil supply would be severely constrained in a world that is only at the beginning of its energy transition and still needs oil and gas to function and support economies.

"If demand does not decline as rapidly as the IEA assumes in its scenario, and the supply side is simultaneously choked off, global energy provision could be threatened and lead to very high energy prices," said the Norwegian Oil and Gas Association, the professional body and employers' association of the industry. Norway, Western Europe's biggest oil producer, has more stringent environmental standards than OPEC's producing countries and pumps oil at one of the world's lowest emissions levels.

In Europe, oil majors are preparing to reduce emissions and gradually slow oil production over the coming decades as per their net-zero by 2050 pledges. However, those firms are also aware of the fact that it will be oil and gas profits that will pay for their 'energy transition' portfolios.

“It’s nice to say that we need to stop producing oil, but if there are no longer enough projects or production, what will happen? Prices will rise,” Patrick Pouyanné, chief executive at TotalEnergies, formerly Total, told France’s Europe 1 radio on Monday.

Over the past decade, Big Oil’s reserves have dropped, but even Europe’s majors, all of which have pledged to become net-zero emission energy businesses, continue to rely on business models dominated by oil and gas sales, Rystad Energy said in a report last month.

“If reserves are not high enough to sustain production levels, companies will find it difficult to fund expensive energy transition projects, resulting in a slowdown of their clean energy plans,” said Parul Chopra, vice president of upstream research at Rystad Energy.

Big Oil had already awakened to the need to invest in low-carbon energy even before last week’s biggest wake-up call from shareholders and climate activists so far. Yet, aggressive reductions—or ‘keeping it in the ground’ as environmentalists demand—in future oil supply beyond the oil majors’ current plans would lead to oil price spikes. It would also leave most of the world’s supply in the hands of OPEC and Russia, where geopolitics is always in a state of flux and where emissions standards are not as high as in Big Oil’s home countries.

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

## **Old Gretna (Mechanikham-Gretna Historic District)**

Mechanikham was established in 1836 when wealthy landowner, Nicholas Noel Destrehan, hired surveyor Benjamin Buisson to divide his long and narrow swath of land on the river into lots. Buisson's original symmetrical plan created a two-block-wide settlement with Huey P. Long Avenue (originally Copernicus Avenue) at the center and one street on either side (now Newton and Weyer Streets). Mechanikham quickly became home to many German immigrants who played a vital role in the City's development and whose descendants became some of Gretna's most prominent citizens.

The community of Gretna was established two years later when the St. Mary's Market Steam Ferry Company purchased and divided a four-block-wide stretch immediately downriver from Mechanikham. Gretna's streets were regularly laid in the same manner as Mechanikham, and its cross streets were numbered as they are today. An essential feature of the new development was its dedicated ferry landing located directly across the river from St. Mary's Market in New Orleans.

## **McDonoghville**

Named for its philanthropic and reclusive founder, John McDonogh, McDonoghville was established in 1815, which makes it Gretna's earliest subdivided development. The McDonoghville Historic District is characterized by modest residences set back on sizeable lots and a lack of commercial corridors, which gives it a sleepy, pastoral atmosphere that is rooted in its origins as a residential farming community. The 1845 guidebook Norman's New Orleans remarked in its brief mention of the place ("MacDonough") that "the country, the beautiful country is all around—and the noise and confusion of the city no longer annoy you." Although McDonoghville has been part of the City of Gretna since 1913, this sense of being removed from city life continues to distinguish it from its more urbanized neighbors.

Before McDonogh purchased the former plantation of Francois Bernoudy in 1813 and founded his namesake settlement, the western bank of the Mississippi River was a long row of working plantations backed by woodlands. McDonogh's property was the site of Monplaisir, a 1750 plantation house built for Jean de Pradel that sat near the present-day McDonoghville-Algiers border. The house and its auxiliary buildings were taken by the river in the late 19th century. McDonogh, who had been residing in New Orleans, moved into the house and divided the remaining land into regular lots and narrow, thirty-arpent strips for farming, which he sold or leased to laborers and some free people of color. While living there, he owned several slaves, whom he educated and encouraged to work for their freedom. Many of those freed men and women settled in a portion of McDonoghville called Freetown.

## **McDonoghville National Register Nomination**

The City of Gretna was recently awarded funds from the National Park Service and Lt. Governor's Office to assist with placing McDonoghville on the National Register of Historic Places.

McDonoghville is considered to be the oldest neighborhood in Jefferson Parish and among the oldest in the Greater New Orleans Region. Even so, there is little comprehensive research regarding the community's origins and evolution. The National Register nomination process is a first step toward better understanding the neighborhood's history.

The City is currently working place McDonoghville on the National Register of Historic Places.



## Green Goddess Pasta Salad with Peas

A quick and easy pasta salad with homemade green goddess dressing! Fresh or frozen peas add a burst of sweetness for the perfect picnic.

### Recipe Notes

Make this pasta salad ahead of time. It soaks into the pasta and provides great flavor! If you are making it ahead of time, be sure to cook the pasta to a firm al dente, or even barely under cooked. That way the pasta will stay firm and springy even when the dressing soaks in.

Don't like chickpeas? Use canned white beans (drained) instead.

Gluten-Free: Substitute your favorite gluten free pasta or use rice noodles (definitely under-cook GF noodles to avoid mushy texture).

Omnivore: Add leftover shredded chicken, cubed ham, or turkey to this pasta salad.

Check the Fridge: You can add frozen or canned corn, sliced radishes, or grated carrots to this recipe to increase the variety of vegetables. You can use other pasta like penne or small shells.
