Happy March! Once again, and hopefully for the last time, I hope everyone is stayed warm and safe with the recent bout of winter weather that we experienced.

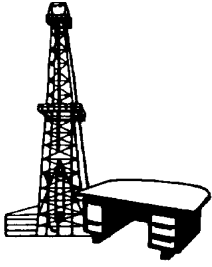

February Membership Meeting

February 16, 2022

Speakers: Barbara Hanson, CPA

"Learn More About Desk and Derrick, the Industry, and You!"

The Desk and Derrick Club of Wichita Falls, Texas had the pleasure of hearing Mrs. Barbara Hanson, CPA, with Hupp, Bauer, Hanson, and Lewis, speak to us on February 16, 2022. This company provides tax preparation, tax planning, estate and trust tax preparation, and Internal Revenue Service (IRS) representation to the Wichita Falls, Texas area. Mrs. Hanson started her presentation discussing virtual currency such as Bitcoin. She explained this currency is required to be reported to the IRS. An example was given that if a person has one dollar in bitcoin and uses this virtual currency to purchase a five-dollar cup of coffee, then you have increased this currency use by four dollars and it is considered a profit and must show this as income on your taxes. The IRS sees this as an item similar to property asset and capital gains tax is incurred. You also must keep a record of all cryptocurrency purchases, trades, and disposals.

Barbara continued with the Advanced Child Credit and your tax preparer will need IRS Letter 6419 (Child Tax Credit) that you received in the mail. This will help you report your advance payments and help you claim Child Tax Credit, if necessary. By having this letter, it will help your tax preparer to avoid any delays in processing your return and the IRS sending your refund.

We were intrigued to find out restaurant meals can be 100 percent deducted from taxes concerning businesses, sorry everyone, the IRS does not see it the same way for all of us "common Joe's" out there! Also, cash charitable donations for those filing as married can be up to six hundred dollars and those filing as single can deduct three hundred dollars. The tax deduction limit for items donated is two hundred-fifty dollars unless you have receipts proving more than that amount.

Mrs. Hanson finished her presentation by discussing how important it is today to E-File your tax return. This is mainly so you will have a record that you filed your taxes and you filed them on time! Barbara did let us know that if you have a business and have more than ten people, you must E-file. She reiterated the standard mileage rate is 58.5 cents per mile for those who travel for business reasons.

Another important notice for taxpayers is the IRS has increased the tax gift exclusion from fifteen thousand to sixteen thousand dollars. For oil and gas companies, Intangible Drilling Costs (IDC) can be deducted in the year in which it was incurred, and Tangible Drilling Costs (TDC) are amortized over seven years' time.

If you are one of the unfortunate individuals who receive a "love letter" from the IRS and you are unable to pay the penalty due to circumstances beyond your control, you could possibly qualify for the IRS's "One-Time Forgiveness Program". Although the IRS is looked upon as the "Spawn of Satan", the IRS will work with taxpayers in unfavorable situations to assist in reducing or removing unwarranted tax burdens. If you are feeling charitable yourself, you can file Form 1099-C for each debtor for whom you canceled \$600 or more of a debt owed to you if these two items are present: you are a relevant financial entity and an attributable event has occurred.

Some members had questions concerning the much heightened "student loan forgiveness" program put forth by the United States Administration. One of those questions is, "do you have to pay taxes on the dollar amount you have forgiven because it might be considered as income?" Barbara clarified that any financial amount that is forgiven is tax free and does not need to be reported on your taxes. Another question is, "when are taxes due?" Mrs. Hanson answered the tax due date is dependent on what state you live in or do business in. Our members received a wealth of information from Mrs. Barbara Hanson, and we learned the intricate crevices of the Internal Revenue Service and how to be prepared when filing our taxes.

Petroleum prices in 'highly unpredictable environment'

Crude oil, natural gas and gasoline prices were all up this week. It's a trend that has been repeated almost weekly since June 2020 when there was an oversupply of product and much lower prices.

That summer U.S. oil inventories, excluding oil in the Strategic Petroleum Reserve, were at 540 million barrels, which was a record. Oil prices were in the \$10 to \$15 range, and retail gasoline was around \$2 per gallon.

On Wednesday, the Energy Information Administration (EIA) said oil inventories fell to 410 million barrels – a 24% decrease since June 2020 – oil prices rose to \$89 and the average price of a gallon of gas was \$3.538 across the U.S.

EIA said commercial inventories “fell to their lowest levels since mid-2014,” and increased its forecast for Brent crude oil by 11% to an average of \$90 per barrel in February.

Natural gas spot prices averaged \$4.38 per million British thermal units (MMBtu) at the U.S. benchmark Henry Hub in January, a 16% increase from December prices, EIA said. Cold weather in the Northeast and Midwest increased demand for natural gas.

Global demand for natural gas also remains strong, and EIA expects 2022 U.S. liquefied natural gas (LNG) exports to increase 16% over 2021 levels.

EIA forecasts that natural gas prices will rise to \$4.70/MMBtu on average in February, then average around \$3.80/MMBtu for the last three quarters of the year.

The average price for regular-grade gasoline was \$3.31 per gallon in January, nearly a dollar higher than one year ago, largely because of higher oil prices. EIA expects gasoline prices will average \$3.24/gal in 2022, dropping below \$3.00/gal in the last quarter.

AAA said the average price for gasoline across the U.S. on Wednesday was \$3.538 an increase of 4.6% since Jan. 3. The average price in Texas was \$3.149.

“Market concerns about oil production disruptions, supply chain vulnerabilities, and uncertainties around how central banks may react to combat inflation all contribute to a highly unpredictable environment for oil and petroleum product prices,” said EIA Acting Administrator Steve Nalley.

Some forecasters are predicting \$100 oil by the third quarter.

Already industry activity is on the rise, and the Texas Petro Index reports an increase in activity of 28.8%.

World Oil magazine reported exploration and production companies will increase capital expenditure 40% this year over 2021 in search for new oil and natural gas reserves.

Petroleum production fell from a record high of 13 million barrels per day just as the pandemic hit and demand dropped quickly. U.S. oil production bottomed at 11 million barrels per day and it has recovered to an estimated 11.9 million b/d.

EIA predicts U.S. oil production will set a record in 2023 averaging 12.6 million b/d. Supply will catch up to demand and prices will begin to drop.

Changes in weather force changes in energy usage

It is well known that if you don't like the current weather in Texas, wait a minute because it's going to change.

The cold snap that blew through Texas a week or so ago brought sub-freezing temperatures for three days, and it was followed with a week of high temperatures in the 60s and 70s this week.

Of course, it did not compare to February 2021 when temperatures in North Texas did not get above freezing for eight days, according to North America Land Data Assimilation System. A week later, the temperature was in the mid-70s across Texas.

During the 2021 event, the Electric Reliability Council of Texas (ERCOT) issued rolling blackouts when demand for electricity exceeded supply. Electricity net generation fell below ERCOT's day-ahead forecast demand shortly after midnight on Feb. 15 and lasted through Feb. 18. Demand reached 70 gigawatts (GW) while supply shortages ranged from 20 to 30 gigawatts, according to Energy Information Administration (EIA) data.

Laws and regulations were passed designed to protect energy facilities before the next storm. The changes mandated winterization and follow-up inspection of generating and transmission equipment and increasing operational reserves.

ERCOT submitted a report in January noting 321 out of 324 electric generation units and transmission facilities fully passed inspection for new winterization regulations from the Public Utility Commission.

Several weeks later a cold front came through.

Unlike in February 2021, this winter's storm didn't cause major declines of energy production (natural gas, wind and coal) in Texas and natural gas-fired power plants in Texas maintained their fuel supply during the cold weather.

Policymakers realize much more needs to be accomplished because electricity demand is rising as the economy of Texas continues to flourish and the population continues to rise.

Texas's energy consumption increased 20% during the last 10 years while population rose 16% to 29 million and the economy was setting records.

Coal, which generated 37% of the electricity in Texas in 2009, generates 20% today, the same as wind. Natural gas generates 47%.

The Public Utility Commissions, which oversees ERCOT, has been tasked with making the electric grid more reliable.

PUC Commissioner Will McAdams recently suggested creating a system with the goal of increased reliability while also addressing the states growing need for additional power.

"The Texas economy is growing rapidly, and we need to address this head-on," he said. "If electricity consumption in the ERCOT region grows just 2% per year, and that is conservative given the number of people and industry relocating here, then we will need 15 GW of additional generation capacity in 10 years just to keep up with the growth - and that is assuming no retirements of existing generation resources," McAdams wrote.

McAdam's memo proposal would incentivize power producers to create plants that could turn on power quickly when the grid needs it and encourage development of battery storage at wind and solar facilities that could feed power into the grid immediately when more power was needed.

Russia challenges resolve of EU, UK and US

Russia's invasion of Ukraine sent financial and energy markets into disarray around the world as governments in western Europe and the United States responded with sanctions.

Crude oil prices immediately rose to more than \$100 per barrel, and natural gas prices in Europe were up 30% on Thursday.

Higher energy prices puts more pressure on inflation and rising interest rates.

President Biden, along with members of the European Union and the United Kingdom, announced on Tuesday the imposition of sanctions on Russia after the Russian military entered Ukraine. The sanctions target Russia's financial services sector prohibiting them from trading in its debt on U.S. and European markets. Further sanctions were expected following Russia's aggression on Thursday.

Germany, which had built an energy system during the last 30 years that relied heavily on oil and natural gas imports from Russia, halted its approval of the new Nord Stream 2 natural gas pipeline from Russia. Russia is the largest provider of natural gas (averaged 10.7 billion cubic feet per day) to EU countries delivered through pipelines in Poland, Germany and Slovakia.

Russia also sells liquefied natural gas (LNG) to the EU accounting for 20% of LNG imports. LNG from the U.S. stands at 26%, which has doubled since November.

Supply shortages have led to rapid price increases from \$9 during the first half of 2021 to \$28 during the last six months. Natural gas prices in the U.S. closed at \$4.50 per million British thermal units on Feb. 22 on the NYMEX.

The impact on crude oil supplies and price could be far reaching.

Russia, who is not an official member of OPEC but has consulted with OPEC on production quotas since 2020, is one of the top three oil producing countries, producing some 11 million barrels per day (b/d). The U.S. is the largest producer at 12 million b/d and Saudi Arabia is third at 10 million b/d.

Russia exports roughly 7.5 million b/d, and an average of 733,000 b/d during the last six months is imported into the U.S., according to the Energy Information, which makes it the third largest importer behind Canada (4.3 million b/d) and Mexico (766,000 b/d). Russian imports exceed those from Saudi Arabia, which averaged 500,000 b/d.

Disruptions of oil, natural gas, and petroleum products from Russia are expected.

Oil markets have been nervous for quite some time as tension escalated in Europe, and global oil demand exceeded supplies.

OPEC+, which includes Russia, increased monthly production quotas by 400,000 b/d in August, but some countries have failed to meet their goal for various reasons. The International Energy Agency reports a 900,000 b/d gap between OPEC+ target and actual production.

Meanwhile, back at the White House, the Biden administration continues to throw roadblocks in front of the U.S. petroleum industry as his agencies push an agenda designed to reduce domestic fossil-fuel production.

The countries in western Europe currently are feeling the pain and paying the price for their dependence on foreign countries to provide the energy they need to warm their homes, fuel their economy, and defend against tyranny.

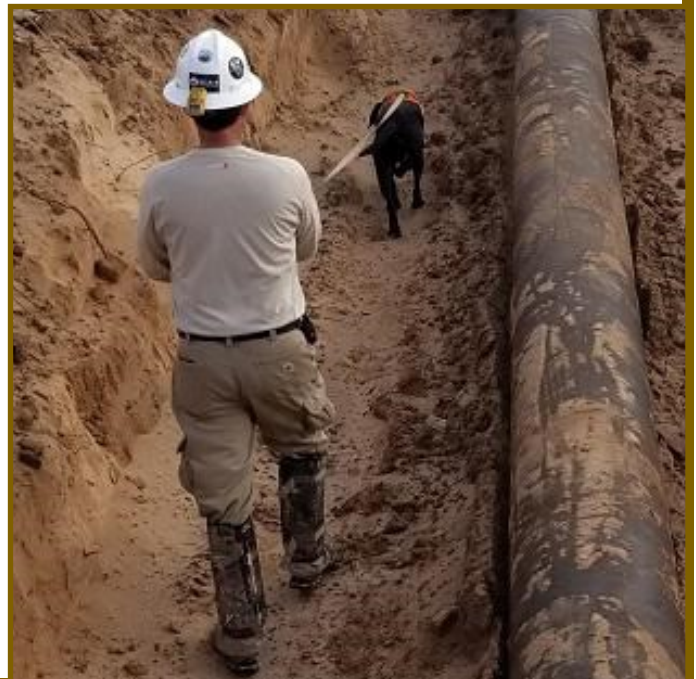

ADDC Bylaws: Article IX - Nominations and Election of Officers

Section 1. They will give us a tour of their yard and explain to us all of their services which include: Fracturing, Cementing, Acidizing and Nitrogen.

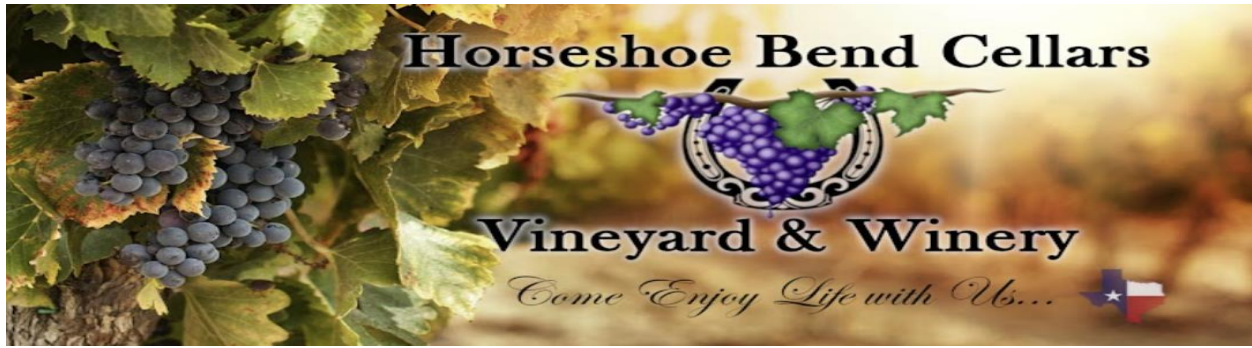

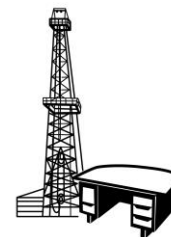
