Roughnecks to the Rescue

March Speaker Recap—by Judi Adams

Our March speaker Randy Miller is well-known to our members. He's part of our extended family— Susan's husband—and he has presented a number of programs over the years. Randy is a very active person; he's retired from USPS and has worked as a local park ranger and a courier for oilfield service companies. But, a few years ago, Randy became very involved with the WWII Museum in New Orleans. His presentation brought the oilfield and the war effort into focus as he spoke on the Nottinghamshire oil wells and the US roughnecks that helped increase oil drilling efforts.

British oilman Phillip Southwell traveled to Washington, D.C. hoping to get help from the US to drill in the fabled Sherwood Forest. After being turned down, he approached oil baron Lloyd Noble, who agreed to send a team of experienced drillers and four rigs for one year.

In 1944, a group of 42 oilfield roughnecks from Texas, Oklahoma, and Louisiana were recruited for an overseas venture that had to be kept secret from the public, both at home and at their destination. I can only imagine the looks on the faces of the locals when this hard-working, tough-talking group showed up in cowboy boots and hats, plaid shirts, and American cigarettes. The locals were told that they were there to film a Western movie, waiting for the star, John Wayne, to arrive. The group were housed at a local monastery where the Rogues and Robes developed trusting and friendly relationships. Of course, once the guys were off the clock they were in town drinking and carousing. Despite the sometimes outrageous behavior, only two of the drilling team were sent back before the project was completed.

Due to the ongoing war, the entire operation had to be cloaked and camouflaged to avoid being seen and destroyed by German bombs. When the contract was completed, the team had completed 106 wells, with 94 producers. They worked with jack-up rigs that could be folded down and skidded easily (well, relatively easily) to the next drill site.

The efforts of this team made it possible for 3.5 million barrels of high grade oil were provided to keep British airplanes flying and fighting.

The team's achievements were not known until after the war when a London newspaper shared the story of the yanks who truly were heroes of Sherwood Forest.

In 1991, the British Government established the Dukes Wood Oil Museum to honor the men and to showcase historical artifacts. It is now housed in the very monastery where these heroes lived with the monks. You can walk a nature trail and see restored nodding donkeys and the statue of The Oil Patch Warrior. Ten years later, an identical statue, using the original mold!, was dedicated to these heroes in Ardmore, Oklahoma.

Throughout the war, then General Dwight D Eisenhower reminded the American oilfield that "OIL IS AMMUNITION."

Thanks to Randy for providing this information. I hope on my next trip to England, I get to visit Nottinghamshire and walk the Dukes Wood Oil Nature Trail. The Desk and Derrick Club of the Westbank will be collecting items for the residents at the St. Joseph Apartments in Gretna at the March meeting.

This year, Susan is focusing on three main collections and distributions: Easter, Thanksgiving, and Christmas

Help fill "Easter Baskets" for these elderly residents. Things they always need are men's/ladies' socks, books, combs, brushes, shower caps, tissues, travel soaps, shampoo, conditioners, pens, stationery, and games. They really appreciate getting single-serving microwave items, like macaroni and cheese, rice-aroni, oatmeal, and grits.

The residents of the St. Joseph Apartments will appreciate it.

Plaquemines Parish Becoming Louisiana's New Energy Hub

Oil- and gas-related investments in Plaquemines Parish, spearheaded by the Plaquemines Port Harbor and Terminal District (PPHTD), hold promise to replace jobs and revenue lost over the past decade as shallow-water production in the region has diminished.

While energy taxes and royalties once totaled \$50 million annually, less than \$10 million is generated today. When PPHTD began its master plan of revitalization in 2013, 630 acres of port property were secured by Venture Global LNG under a long-term lease to construct one of the largest liquified natural gas (LNG) processing plants in the world.

Currently, Venture Global LNG is constructing and developing 70 million metric tons per annum (MTPA) of production capacity in Louisiana to provide clean, affordable energy to the world. The Plaquemines LNG facility will produce 20 MTPA with an \$8 billion investment.

While Plaquemines LNG is under construction, the global demand of LNG has Venture Global planning Delta LNG, a duplicate of Plaquemines LNG adjoining Plaquemines LNG on its south side on an additional 600 acres of land leased from PPHTD. The two projects will provide several thousand construction jobs and several hundred permanent jobs.

Venture Global's decision to locate in Plaquemines Parish was a result of the convergence of numerous natural-gas pipelines for its feedstock as well as the adjacent Mississippi River providing access for large vessels to transfer the LNG product to locations around the globe.

Other projects under construction are also a result of the unique geography of Plaquemines Parish. NOLA Oil Terminal LLC is constructing a \$930 million export terminal with two deep-water berths to accommodate 170,000-ton vessels. Three hundred million dollars of dock and wharf funding facilitated by PPHTD will be used in the project. The import-export terminal is estimated to create more than 1,000 construction jobs.

Work is also underway to convert the aging Phillips 66 refinery in Alliance to an oil terminal. The refinery was heavily damaged due to flooding brought on by Hurricane Ida in the summer of 2021. In May of 2022, our office will announce plans to finish the cleanup and commence construction of the new terminal.

In all new developments, the proximity of the PPHTD to the Mississippi River and nearby pipelines was often the deciding factor in companies choosing to invest in Plaquemines Parish. Recognizing the existing infrastructure will inevitably create more opportunities, such as providing a 7-mile rail extension to reach the site of a proposed container port and allowing rail access to public and private lands along the river.

The construction of a container terminal is the pinnacle of executing the port's master plan for development. However, the port's early successes are credited to its oiland gas-related projects. We were very fortunate that Venture Global LNG came along soon after our land investment in Plaquemines Parish. Our community is suffering greatly, with public funds from oil and gas revenues plunging 80% as drilling has moved offshore.

While it's no longer drilling and production providing revenues, investments in new forms of energy have shown promise, and we are excited to work with the oil and gas industry as opportunities for growth lay ahead.



Stuffed Crescent Roll Carrots

Prep	Total	Ingredients	Servings
35 min	40 min	8	8



- 8 (12x4-inch) sheets of foil
- 1 can (8 oz) refrigerated Pillsbury[™] Original Crescent Rolls (8 Count) or 1 can (8 oz) refrigerated Pillsbury[™] Original Crescent Dough Sheet
- 1 package (8 oz) cream cheese, softened
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh parsley
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh chives
 - 1 teaspoon grated lemon peel
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 16 small sprigs fresh parsley

Chicken Little Stuffed Eggs

Prep	Total	Ingredients	Servings
30 min	1 hr 15 min	4	8

Ingredients

- 8 eggs
- 5 drops blue, red or green food color, if desired
- 2 tablespoons mayonnaise
- 1 tablespoon hot dog relish

Steps

- 1 Place eggs in medium saucepan; cover with cold water. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer about 15 minutes. Immediately drain; run cold water over eggs to stop cooking. Peel eggs.
- 2 In measuring cup or old coffee mug, combine 1/2 cup water and food color. Dip peeled eggs 1 at a time into mixture for several seconds until of desired color. Pat dry with paper towel.
- 3 Cut thin slice from wide bottom of each egg so it will stand straight. With small sharp knife, cut off top of each egg about 1/3 of the way down, either straight across or with small slanted cuts to make a sawtooth edge. Carefully remove top portion and yolk; reserve tops. Place yolks in small bowl.
- 4 Add mayonnaise and relish to yolks; mash and mix thoroughly with fork. With small spoon, refill large section of egg with yolk mixture, heaping filling. Top each with reserved top portion of egg. Refrigerate 30 minutes or until chilled.

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Steps

- Heat oven to 400°F. Roll sheets of foil from shorter ends into cone-shaped molds. Unroll dough on work surface; if using crescent rolls, press seams to seal. Use pizza cutter or knife to cut dough lengthwise into 8 (1-inch) strips.
- 2 Wrap 1 strip around each foil mold to create carrot shape. Place 1 inch apart on ungreased cookie sheet.
- 3 Bake 7 to 9 minutes or until golden brown. Transfer to cooling rack; cool completely before removing foil molds.
- 4 In medium bowl, beat cream cheese, parsley, chives, lemon peel and salt with electric mixer on medium speed until smooth and combined. Pipe or spoon cream cheese mixture into cavity of each crescent. Top with 2 sprigs parsley for carrot top.
