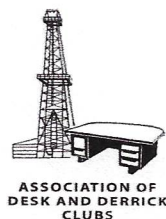

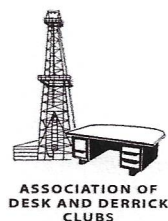

A LITTLE HISTORY OF REGAL PLASTIC SUPPLY CO OF LOUISIANA

The certificate of incorporation of Regal is dated February 28, 1955, and in Kansas City, MO. Jerry Kivett and his wife Ruth, Joe Slavik and his wife Florence became the principal owners and each owned 125 shares of stock and value at \$10 per share.

There was a slogan that would run in the Kansas City Star, "You can make Almost anything from Plastic".

In the summer 1955, Joe Slavik called Ed Statter, who was working for a company called Holiday and offered him a job. Ed knew that Joe was a smart man so without asking about the position or salary, Ed took the job, knowing that Joe was going to be a success and he wanted to be part of it.

Joe was paying attention to franchising like, Kentucky Fried Chicken and McDonald's and Joe thought if he could franchise Regal with the headquarters in North Kansas City, Missouri, each location would carry their own inventory tailored to the needs of its area and offer customer complete local availability of stock, and sales.

In 1957, Joe sent Ed to Denver to buy the Regal franchise from Floyd Williams and Bill Braum, because they were sinking. Joe and Ed bought out Braun's shares, with Williams staying on. Each owned one third of the company.

In March 1958, Ed moved his family to Denver to focus on sales and distribution. Denver did become a successful location, and before Ed retired, he sold Regal to another Plastic company.

By 1959, Joe purchases Kivett's shares and hired Dick Cull to come to work for Regal. Joe was committed to plastic sales and fabrication. They had moved to a bigger building and was ready to see the company grow.

In 1962, Joe bought a franchise in Des Moines and moved that location to Omaha, Nebraska and he had Dick Cull manage this location. A company called Omaha Works manufactured a sizeable percentage of the wire and cable needed to supply Western Electric so, Dick quickly became friends with the purchasing agent from the Western Electric and Regal was satisfying the Omaha Work's diverse plastic needs.

Joe retired in 1984 and his sons and son-in-law ran the companies until 5 years ago and now the grandsons do. They are 13 locations under the Kansas City main office.

Joe passed away in 2007.

NOW HOW DID DARYL GET TO SHREVEPORT?

In 1956, when Robert (Bob) Stash was on a business trip in Chicago, he met Joe Slavik and decided that Regal Plastic would be a great franchise in Shreveport.

So, Dr. Morgan Whitsitt Matthews and Robert (Bob) Stash purchased the right to franchise the Regal Plastic Supply Company and \$10,000 of material to open a distribution and fabrication business in Shreveport, on Wilson St., a side street off of Texas Avenue.

Dr. Matthews invested in the business, but Bob was to run the day-to-day operations.

Bob didn't have the experience in the plastics distribution, so he traveled to Kansas City for a week to learn about fabrication and other aspects of the business.

Most of their business were selling to department stores and fabrication to some small business. Shreveport did not have the manufacturing economy as the larger markets and like Dallas and Kansas City and so the KC office did not think Shreveport would make it in the plastic world.

In 1960, Dr. Matthews sold his part of Regal to Bob, and he continued to develop his business, which was growing out of the warehouse and office. This is when Bob built the building on Greenwood Road, where we are located now.

Daryl was hired by Joe Slavik in 1971 and Daryl meet Bob Stash on one of his visits to Kansas City to see the Slavik's.

On the advice of a college friend, Daryl moved to Houston, Texas to go to work for A-1 Plastics as an inside salesman.

In 1971, Don Walker was given the opportunity to open a Regal Plastic Supply Company in Dallas. So few years later, Don called Daryl, still working for A-1 Plastics and convinced him to go check out the market likes in San Antonio. Daryl liked San Antonio and he said, "it was a rapidly growing City and there wasn't too much competition'.

Don opened a Regal in San Antonio and Daryl moved there to manage the location.

In 1989, Bob Stash was getting ready to retire, so he called Daryl and asked if he was interested in buying the Shreveport office. Daryl bought the company and moved to Shreveport.

In 1995, Daryl bought Champion Industries in Baton Rouge and in 1998, Daryl changed the company name to Regal Plastic Supply Company.

Daryl and I were married on May 18, 2002.

Now with great employees in both locations, we are strong and growing.

REGAL PLASTICS

They are 2 locations for Regal, Shreveport, and Baton Rouge. Shreveport opened in 1956 and Daryl bought the Baton Rouge office in 1989.

Regal is a plastic sheet rod and tube distributor for approximately 75 manufactures. We also provide plastic fabrication.

Regal stocks Plexiglas, Polycarbonate, UHMW, HDPE, Polypropylene, Nylons, Teflons and many other items including Graphic Vinyls for the Sign Industry.

We can do fabrications such as display cases for sports memorabilia, church podiums, light difussers, partions and the some of the Covid Sneeze guards were made by Regal.

We are proud to be associated with Saint Jude's Home Giveaway. Regal has manufactured approximately 35 large tumblers that are used for their drawing in over 40 locations.

The product UHMW NYLONSS and HDPE are used as a conveyer and dump truck liners. Several area restaurants by their cutting boards from us. Nylons are used for bushing and mearings and used mostly by machine shops making parts for the Oil and Gas Industry.

We stock Orafol Graphic Vinyls for over 25 Sign Companies and more recently selling to individuals working on their at home crafts.

We have built for Willis Knighton trash bins, several items to hold food products in their dining areas and holders for the blood pressure cuffs.

Some notable things we are proud are, fabrication a display box for one of Wilson Volleyballs from the movie Castaway, starring Tom Hanks. Made a retaining wall and other fabrication items needed for the movie The Guardian.


The Baton Rouge Office stocks many items we do and plastic pipe, valves and fitting for the Petroleum Industry.

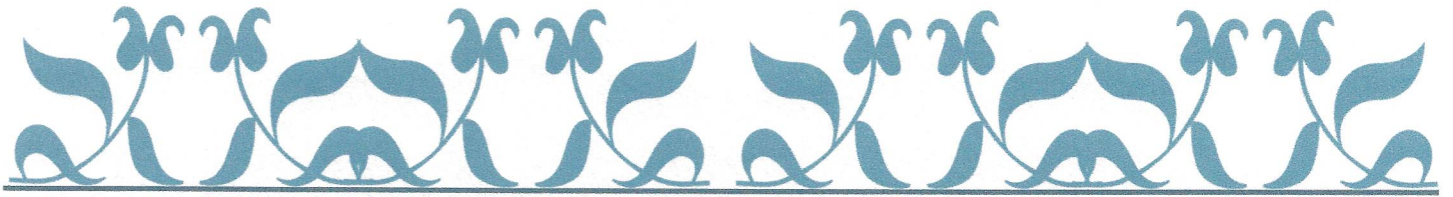

INTERVIEW WITH A RED RIVER CLUB ADVISOR
(Louise F. Pearce)

1. How did you learn of Desk and Derrick?

I do not remember where I first heard of Desk & Derrick (D&D), but through Laretta Randle was how I really learned about D&D. Laretta and I worked together for years and she was, and is, an active member of Red River Desk and Derrick (RRDD).

2. What is your connection to Red River D&D? Who asked you?

Laretta Randle and I worked together for years, and she is my connection to RRDD. Laretta has been active in RRDD for many years, and she invited me to become an Advisor. She enthusiastically told me all about this impressive organization.

3. What benefits to do you feel RRDD gives to employees, employers? What have you gained from your association with RRDD?

Benefits RRDD gives to employees:

A. Provides opportunities to develop professionally by becoming more educated, more well-rounded, and making contacts, through:

(1) Hearing educational speakers at regular RRDD meetings and seminars, and regional meetings and seminars.

(2) Meeting others in the oil and gas industry by attending meetings and seminars.

By simply attending regular RRDD meetings, a member can usually meet others who work in the same area of expertise, and certainly can meet people who work in a different aspect of the industry. The opportunity to learn from others representing quite a diversity of fields in our industry in my opinion offers one of the biggest advantages of being a member of RRDD. This diversity of membership is somewhat unique. Instead of being an organization of just division order analysts, title analysts, landmen, oil and gas accountants, engineers, or whatever, RRDD brings together people from a broad spectrum of fields in the industry. The more we ask questions of those working in a different aspect of our industry, the more we will learn and understand about the industry as a whole.

(3) Participating in educational field trips.

(4) Volunteering to help other oil and gas organizations when needed (for example, helping with event registration). This is another means of meeting others in the industry from various fields.

B. Provides opportunities to participate in activities which benefit others.

(1) Some such activities are related to helping or encouraging people interested in the industry.

(a) Scholarship program at the college level, for those pursuing a degree in a major related to our industry

This encourages the students and promotes good relations with the students and their parents.

(b) Essay contest for younger students

The essays are always on a thought-provoking topic related to our industry. This serves not only to educate the students, but presumably their parents as well. The winning students as well as their sponsoring teachers are financially rewarded. This provides encouragement to younger students who may become interested in a career in our industry, and promotes good relations with the students, teachers, and parents.

(2) Some such activities are related to helping the community.

(a) Fund-raising for good causes (for example, to buy bullet-proof vests for law enforcement personnel)

(b) Having speakers on topics important in the community (for example, having a representative from the Sheriff's Office talk about "Safety Town" for children, a project by the Sheriff's Office which educates children about safety)

C. Provides opportunities to develop personal, long-lasting friendships with people who are extremely nice, caring, fun, supportive, encouraging, helpful, friendly, and genuinely fond of each other.

D. Helps an employee stay excited about the industry.

Our industry is cyclical, so it is always subject to upswings and downturns. In addition, the current political administration in the White House, the majority of the U. S. Senate, about half of the U. S. House of Representatives, and most people in the media are extremely anti-industry. Therefore, at times it is hard to remain hopeful about the future of the industry. I have found RRDD members to be happy people who consistently seem very enthusiastic about, and proud of, our industry. This is contagious. The members of RRDD tend to remain excited about the industry.

Benefits RRDD gives to Employers:

A. Enhances an employee's value to the employer through many of the things that benefit the employees. For instance, an employee will be:

(1) More developed professionally

(a) Will be more educated

(b) Will be more well-rounded

(c) Will have more industry contacts and more diverse industry contacts

(2) More enthusiastic about the industry

B. An employee's participation in the various activities of the organization increases the exposure of the employer, which is good for networking, public relations, and sometimes business.

What I have gained from my association with RRDD:

The things that benefit employees have also benefited me as an Advisor. I have had opportunities through RRD&D to:

A. Become more educated

- B. Become more well-rounded
- C. Make more industry contacts
- D. Make new friends
- E. Remain enthusiastic and excited about the industry

4. You are an employer; what do you think RRDD can do to get more employers to support the Club, add employees, provide speakers, support fund-raising projects?

- A. Perhaps have the members and other Advisors of RRDD think about some of the above questions (for example, benefits of RRDD to employees and employers), submit and discuss ideas, and pull the information together to make a concise but convincing and professional-type brochure to send out to companies, highlighting RRDD. Or, to save money, RRDD could simply develop a letter to be sent out to companies. Such a brochure or letter could also include a brief description and history of RRDD.
- B. Encourage members to talk to their co-workers and their bosses about the benefits of membership in RRDD to employees and employers.
- C. Consider advertising in the ALTAPL (Ark-La-Tex Association of Professional Landmen) or SGS (Shreveport Geological Society) newsletter.
- D. Consider asking permission to submit an article highlighting RRDD in the ALTAPL or SGS newsletter.
- E. When you invite an industry person to speak at a meeting or seminar, tell them about RRDD (and the benefits of membership to employees and employers) and ask them to consider encouraging their employees to join.
- F. Tell companies about the good exposure a company gets by having its employees join RRDD, sponsoring events, providing speakers, and supporting fund-raising projects.
- G. RRDD could look at a drilling report from LOGA to get an idea of the companies which are most active drilling-wise in North Louisiana, and could target those companies along with any others.

5. Do you have suggestions for speakers, seminars, field trips?

Suggestions for speakers:

- A. Someone from one of the companies in South Louisiana to speak about LNG exports
- B. Jimmy Marston to talk about interesting times in his career as a landman and Land Manager
- C. An engineer or geologist to give the basics of frac'ing
- D. Have a discussion among the members about whether or not you want to delve into the field of alternative forms of energy for a speaker
- E. Someone to discuss any of the topics below, under "Suggestions for seminars"
- F. Ken Womack, CPL, to speak about the history and local connections of United Gas

Suggestions for seminars

- A. Seminar for ½ day or 1 day (or 2 days) where a general, basic overview of specific facets of the industry is given; for example, a few of the following:

- (1) Division Order analysis
- (2) Title work/abstracting
- (3) Title opinions
- (4) Landwork (Running records, leasing, negotiating, settling damages, etc.)
- (5) Louisiana O&G law (or a specific topic within the law; for example, mineral servitudes)
- (6) Contracts (or a specific contract; for example, a Joint Operating Agreement, or Farmout)
- (7) Oil and gas accounting (or a specific topic; for example, joint interest billing)
- (8) Originating a prospect (from the idea to the brochure)
- (9) Drilling and completing a well
- (10) Developing a prospect (drilling plan)
- (11) Horizontal drilling, frac'ing, and completions
- (12) Unitization
- (13) Marketing oil and gas (including building a pipeline)
- (14) Disposing of saltwater
- (15) Secondary recovery
- (16) Oilfield surveying

Suggestions for field trips:

- A. The Port of Shreveport/Bossier (but I think you have already done this)
- B. An active drilling or completion location for a vertical or horizontal well
- C. A location where frac'ing is taking place
- D. A refinery
- E. A plant where they get products from gas (for example, the Cotton Valley Plant; however, I do not know if it is still in operation)

6. Do you have any questions for new Advisors?

Assuming this question is for potential Advisors:

- A. Can you attend at least some of the meetings?
- B. How do you feel about the future of the oil and gas industry?

If this question is not for potential Advisors, but is for newly-named Advisors:

- A. Do you have employees you could encourage to join?

Re: Question Sent to LP by LaVerne by Email Dated 1-23-2023 (2:33 p. m.)

We can't seem to get any men employed in the petroleum industry to join D&D. Do you have any suggestions as to what we can do to get at least the men working in the offices to join?

- A. Educate the public about the benefits of membership in RRDD (to employees and employers) and the fact that RRDD is not just for women.

If RRDD sends out brochures or letters to companies (as was suggested above), a section could be included discussing these items.

- B. Get suggestions from other chapters which have male members.
- C. Determine what specific fields have a lot of males working in them (for example, departments having landmen, engineers, division order analysts, title analysts, accountants, insurance agents, etc.) and target these fields.
- D. Ask other RRDD Advisors the above question; and ask if they know of males in their companies who might be interested in joining.

Crater of Diamonds State Park, Murfreesboro, AR

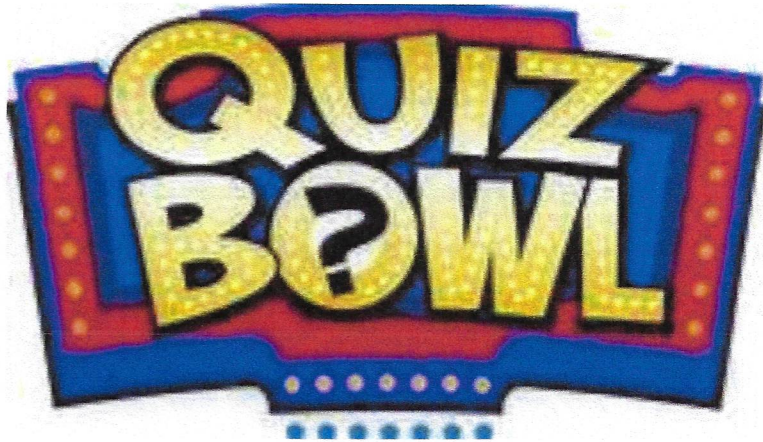


Crater of Diamonds State Park is a 911-acre (369 ha) Arkansas state park in Pike County, Arkansas, in the United States. The park features a 37.5-acre (15.2 ha) plowed field, the world's only diamond-bearing site accessible to the public. Diamonds have continuously been discovered in the field since 1906, including the graded-perfect Strawn-Wagner Diamond, found in 1990, and the Uncle Sam, found in 1924, which at over 40 carats is the largest diamond ever found in the United States.

The site became a state park in 1972 after the Arkansas Department of Parks and Tourism purchased the site from the Arkansas Diamond Company and Ozark Diamond Mines Corporation, who had previously operated the site as a tourist attraction.^[1]
