

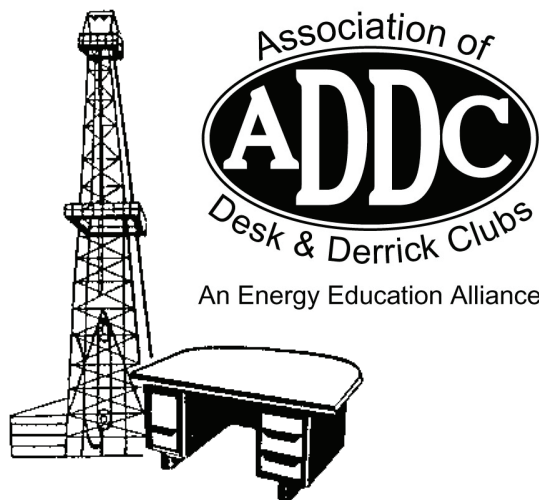

In the Beginning Was the New Orleans Club ...

In 1949, Inez Awty Schaeffer suggested the idea of a personal meeting and the idea became a reality with a cocktail party sponsored by Inez's boss, Mr. John Bricker, and Mr. William G. Helis, Jr. Seventy-nine women from nineteen oil companies attended the cocktail party and it turned out to be a huge success.

Over a lunch a couple of weeks later Inez was encouraged to pursue her idea further. From this idea a club was born. A democratic process was used to select the first Board of Directors. Twelve women that had attended the cocktail party representing major oil companies, independent oil producers, oil service companies and consultants became charter members and the board of directors. The task of sending 700 letters of invitation and membership applications, from a list compiled from a petroleum directory, fell on those twelve.

The date of the first meeting was June 9, 1949 at La Louisianne Restaurant with 200 attending. The name "Desk and Derrick", suggested by Dr. Gordon Atwater, a consulting geologist, was unanimously agreed upon by the board at its first meeting.

The Articles of Incorporation were being drawn up even before that first meeting was held and Lee Wilson Hoover and Camella Bustetter handled this tremendous undertaking. The fledgling club treasury was not only lean it was almost non-existent, and retaining a professional for this task was unrealistic. Lee prevailed upon the help of one of the men at Freeport Sulphur where she was employed. He did not submit even a nominal charge for his services, so to show their gratitude, Lee and Camella baked him his favorite pie.

The club membership that first year was approximately 300 and the dues were set at \$3.00 per year. The board meetings were held on a Saturday with lunch, taking up most of the afternoon. The first issue of the New Orleans *Desk and Derrick Times* was published in August, 1949. It was run on a mimeograph machine until Southern Blueprint generously offered to reproduce it for us. The first Industry Appreciation Night was held on November 16, 1949 at the St. Charles Hotel with 500 people attending. The cost was \$2.00 per person.

In July 1951, the Association of Desk and Derrick Clubs of North America was formed in Jackson, Los Angeles and Houston with New Orleans as the founding club. The New Orleans Club had the distinction of having its own Lee Wilson Hoover as the first Association president, Enid Bahle as secretary and Virginia Murray as treasurer.

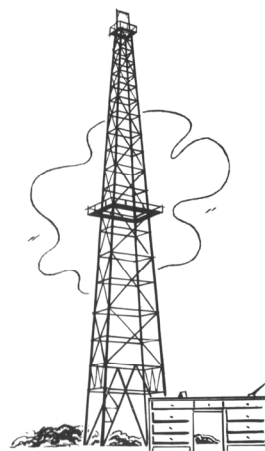
Instead — When days go wrong and the comfort of

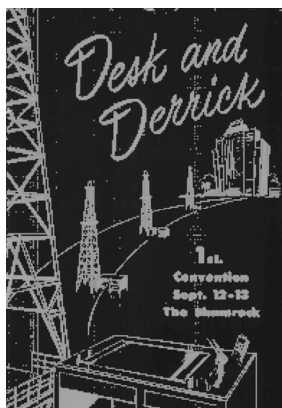

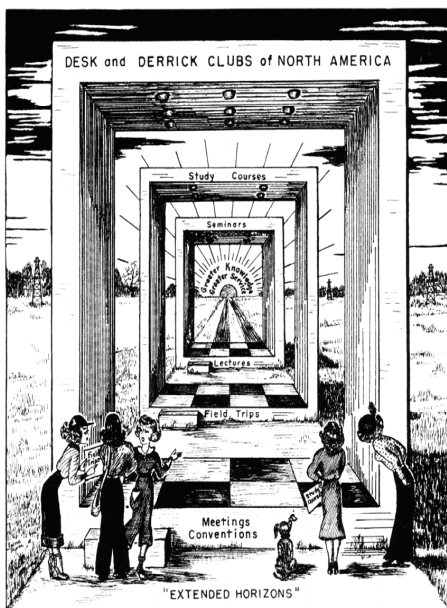
