While visiting Charles Schwab's office this week to update an account for the office, I asked the agent a couple questions about our personal account and learned some information that might be helpful to you as well. When Gary and I opened our account several years ago with TD Ameritrade, which has since been merged into Charles Schwab, we opened it in both our names as "tenants in common". The agent suggested we might want to change the account to one that is "joint tenants with right of survivorship". The difference is that with a "tenants in common" account should one tenant/owner pass away their share of the account does not automatically transfer to the remaining person but to the deceased's estate which could involve some unnecessary legal work and expense. In a "joint tenants with right of survivorship" account the decease's share of the account automatically passes to the surviving tenant/owner. Of course, the above is my understanding of what the agent explained regarding our account and should not be considered as legal advice. But, should this situation apply to you, you might want to check with your financial advisor for their opinion.

In past years, February has delivered some of the coldest, snowiest weather of the winter. I hope you are enjoying what, so far, has been some of the mildest weather this winter. It probably won't last, but enjoy it while it's here.



COULD IDLE OIL AND GAS WELLS BE TURNED INTO BATTERIES?

I've noticed my cell phone's battery doesn't seem to last as long as it did when it was new---even though I plug in to be recharged regularly and don't leave it plugged in after it says it has reached 100% charge. I guess I'm going to need to purchase a new battery. That got me to thinking---how does a battery work anyway?



According to Microsoft's new AI called Copilot, the following is a "simplified" explanation of how batteries work:

Basic Battery Structure:

- 1. A battery consists of atoms, which in turn are composed of protons, neutrons, and electrons.
- 2. Inside a battery, there are positive and negative electrodes separated by an electrolyte solution.
- 3. The positive electrode (cathode) has more protons than electrons, resulting In a positive charge.
 - 4 The negative electrode (anode) has an excess of electrons compared to protons.
- 5.Electrons flow from the anode to the cathode through the electrolyte solution to a device.
- 6. Once all excess electrons have moved to the cathode, the battery is depleted and cannot power devices anymore. (In other words, it's a dead battery-Been there!)

Rechargeable Battery Process:

- 1. Rechargeable batteries can reverse this electron flow using a charger.
- 2. When charging, the anode regains its surplus of electrons, allowing it to release energy again.
- 3. This reversible process makes rechargeable batteries more efficient, energy-conscious, and cost-effective in the long run.

I don't know about you, but that didn't sound so simple to me. The short explanation is that a battery is like a little chemical factory that stores and releases energy. I think I like this short version best.

Okay, now we know how a battery works, how does all this relate to turning idle oil and gas wells into batteries? Energy storage is the capture of energy produced at one time for use at a later time to reduce imbalances between energy demand and energy production. A device that stores energy is generally called an accumulator or a battery.

After a well has reached its economic life with no prospect of further production, the operator is supposed to go through the expensive process of plugging the hole to prevent methane from escaping into the atmosphere and potential toxic chemicals from leaking into the groundwater. With that accomplished, the surrounding surface needs to be restored to usable ground. But, what if the hole could have another use? That would be a win-win for the operator, the new user, and the ultimate consumer.

Idle oil and gas wells have the potential to become the greenest energy storage systems in existence. Here are a few fascinating approaches:

Gravity Energy Storage Systems (GESSs):

Abandoned oil wells near existing grids can be repurposed into utility-scale GESSs. A Gravity Well charges and discharges by lifting and lowering a long cylindrical weight, which consists of used oilfield tubing or casing and a high-density filling. The weight is suspended by wire rope in an idle well that has been sealed with a cement plug. An ultra-high-efficiency motor-generator converts the system's potential energy into electrical energy for use on the grid. The depth and dimensions of some idle wells make them ideal candidates for this purpose.¹

Compressed Natural Gas Reservoirs:

Researchers propose using depleted oil and gas wells as reservoirs for compressed natural gas (CNG) storage. When needed, the gas can be released to spin a turbine and generate electricity. The reservoir is recharged using excess electricity from the grid, creating a sustainable cycle for energy storage.¹

High-Pressure Air Storage:

Another innovative approach involves using compressors to convert sustainable power generated by solar panels and windmills near idle wells into highly pressurized air. This compressed air can then be stored in subsurface saline aquifers or shallow wet sands, providing an efficient energy storage solution.²

By re-purposing these idle wells, we have the potential to harness their existing infrastructure to address the growing demand for energy storage while contributing to a more sustainable future. Who knew oil and gas wells could become an important element in the green energy movement?
