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LIPSTICK ON A PIG

Put all the lipstick you want on wind and solar - still a pig. In the summer of 2023, the Biden administration was proudly touting that, by 2030, offshore wind would power 10 million homes along the US east coast. Then the lipstick came off and the developers cancelled the much-hailed projects... citing the realities of high costs and low returns.

David Hardy, CEO of one of the failed projects, said: "...we thought we could build projects that were inexpensive, large projects right out of the gate. And it turns out that we probably still need to go through the same learning curve that Europe did, with higher prices in the beginning and a little slower pace." What does he mean by Europe's learning curve??? What he means is Germany has been experimenting with wind and solar for 20 years and Germany's electricity prices are now three times higher than US prices. And what David Hardy doesn't say: the US natural gas industry is saving Europe from starvation and freezing by supplying the liquified natural gas Europe relies on during days and weeks when wind isn't blowing and the sun isn't shining.

What's worse: the US offshore projects failed even though the Biden administration gave sweetheart terms. First, the wind projects were guaranteed high payments per kilowatt hour even though the electricity the turbines generate is unreliable. This leaves coal and natural gas fired plants to serve in the workhorse role of providing reliable electricity 24-7, and at less favorable rates. Second, the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management waived bonding fees on the Massachusetts offshore wind project. The bonds would have provided funding to remove the turbines either at failure or end of life.

We've discussed bonding in past blog articles. Claiming "grave risks to the environment" the environmental extremists are screaming for radical bond increases on oil and gas wells. Is there some magical lipstick that prevents wind turbines and solar farms from harming the environment? Obviously not. Wind turbines and solar farms have end of life clean-up consequences... just like oil and gas wells or any other form of energy harvest.



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Solar panels contain lead, cadium, and other toxic minerals.

Their lifespan is less than 20 years.

But the extremists use "green" lipstick to hide the ugly end-of-life consequences of wind and solar... as well as the ugliness of turbine and solar farm operations.

A little-known fact about that wind project off the coast of Massachusetts... the federal permit acknowledges the wind project will kill whales... and the permit allows that killing. Huh? And those not distracted by the lipstick have seen the eagles and other birds killed by spinning turbine blades and fried by the intense heat reflected from solar farms.

Environmental Compliance

There are many facets to drilling a natural gas well. One of them being environmental compliance. What is environmental compliance and how does Range Resources handle it's various aspects? Our 2024 Three Rivers meetings began with a three part series to answer these questions. The first topic, Introduction to Environmental Compliance (EC), was presented by Jeremy Matinko, Range's VP of Environmental Compliance, Jon Dufalla, Range's Environmental Compliance Manager, and Ian Haley, Range's Environmental Compliance Coordinator.

The environmental compliance department supports, guides and advises the operational groups of Range during all phases of activity; such as, inspecting regulated activities and auditing compliance with environmental laws, rules and regulations. EC administers Range's Environmental Policy and is the main contact for communication with external regulators. The following are the regulating companies for Range activities: PA DEP, EPA, PA Fish and Boat, SRBC, and Allegheny County Health Department. Mr. Matinko introduced the series and the first speaker Mr. Jon Dufalla.

Mr. Dufalla, employed by Range for 9 years, explained that the Range EC department consists of the following sections: air, implementation, subsurface operations, surface activities and waste. Following are their duties and responsibilities: field inspections; remediation of environmental incidents; regulatory reporting; permitting; providing guidance on applications regarding oil and gas related regulations and requirements; tracking and reporting of environmental statistics and metrics; responding to requests, inquiries, and correspondence from regulatory agencies; inspection of erosion control and storm water BMP's; inspection of best practices and material management; emissions leak surveys; and remediation and management of environmental incidents. Their biggest project is erosion and storm water control. Eight times a year they perform emission leak surveys.

Under their Stewardship Program, they administer habitat enhancement and reforestation. EC also has a strong involvement in the community by teaming with local partners for projects such as tire removal, trout stocking, and tree planting. Range is always looking for environmental projects. A question from the attendees: Where were the tires that you removed? Answer: A cleanup over a cliff in Meadowcroft.

Mr. Haley, who has also been with Range for 9 years, described his responsibilities as EC coordinator. His group is small, very versatile and takes a proactive approach. They assist and support the EC staff and operations and provide technical resources and guidance. Their objective is to keep environmental compliance guidance clear, correct, consistent and available. This includes: compliance programs, inspections, reports, documentation, forms, the SharePoint site, RSG (responsibly sourced gas) initiatives, EC alerts, EC base training, contingency plans, special projects, and field equipment management.
