

Holiday Travel: Traveling to see your loved ones whether by planes, trains, automobiles, or bus, all transportation requires petroleum products.



(Closed meeting)

Approval of Slate of Officers and Directors for 2025 Review of ADDC Convention 2025 Committee Positions

Sheila McGaughey, Nominating Committee Chair, thanked her committee members, Nicole Harney and Diana Walker, for all of their help. Sheila announced the proposed slate of officers for 2025:

President - Tracy Flynn.
Vice president - Diana Walker.
Treasurer - Lauren Martin
Secretary - Sheila McGaughey.
One Year Director - Debbie Hicks
Two Year director - Katie Curl
Immediate Past President - Rena Schaffer

Diana Walker, Parliamentarian, confirmed a quorum was present. Being that there were not any nominations from the floor, Rena Shaffer, as Presiding Officer, closed the nominations. Our Bylaws stipulate that if there is only one nominee for each office, the Officers and Directors may be elected by voice vote. There were no objections to the election being held by voice vote.

Rena asked for a motion to accept the 2025 slate of officers as presented by the Nominating Committee.

Nicole Harney has made a motion to accept the 2025 slate of officers as presented by the nominating committee, and the motion was seconded by Nelva White.

The motion was carried by the Aye votes.

Rena reminded the 2024 Board members and Committee Chairmen, to start putting their files together so they can be passed along to the 2025 Board members and Committee Chairmen. Current Committee Chairmen were also reminded to send their end of year report to her. This is just a short report, a summary of what your Board position or your committee did this year. List your accomplishments, what worked, what didn't work, and any suggestions for the new people that are taking over. Place a copy of the report in your committee files. Contact Rena if you have any questions about preparing that.

At the ADDC convention held in Dallas back in September, the proposal to increase our ADDC dues was approved.

We currently pay \$65 for our dues here in Wichita Falls. We forward \$55.00 to ADDC for dues, \$3.00 goes to Central Region and our Club keeps \$7.00. The ADDC dues increased to \$70.00 effective January 2025, Central Region will continue to receive \$3.00 and our club will keep the current \$7.00, so the total dues will be increased to \$80.00. The Club has received the 2025 renewal forms and those will be sent to you in the near future and it will have the new dues amount.

Rena has also emailed members concerning our meal cost. We currently pay \$19.00 for our meal cost to Bistro each month with the exception of the Industry Appreciation luncheon and this \$19.00

only covers our meal cost. The club has been picking up additional costs each month. These extra costs include:

Room: \$65.00 per month (not including the Appreciation Luncheon or December meeting, which is held at night, those are more expensive.)

Tablecloths: \$10.00 each - we usually have 7 to 8 per meeting.

Tax on the Meal: around \$25.00 based on cost of meals for 15 attendees.

Our Club picks up at least \$175.00 each month, so the Board has proposed to increase our meal cost to \$20. This will only cover the meal cost and the Club will continue to pick up the additional cost.

Rena asked for a motion to increase the monthly meal cost to \$20.00, not including the industry Appreciation Luncheon, effective January 1st, 2025.

Tracy Flynn made the motion that we change our meal cost to \$20.00 a month, Vickie Young seconded the motion.

Our Tally Committee Members, Doris Sterling and Jordan Jackson, were ready to count hands as we did a vote by hands. Rena asked for those in favor of raising our meal costs to \$20.00 to raise their hand and also those against raising the meal costs to raise their hand. The motion passed.

While Rena went over this at our Industry Appreciation Luncheon, she wanted to brag about our membership a little bit. We have four Regions, and our Members write summaries of our meetings, our Field Trips and our seminars and submit them each year to the ADDC Contest Committee. The Contest Committee lines up three judges per region. They're not allowed to judge their own region. Our Club submitted an entry in each category except one. The Wichita Falls Club entered eight entries and if you recall at our region meeting in April up in Kansas, our Club won first place in all eight of those categories that we entered.

After that, the First-place entries in each of the four Regions are judged again by different judges, and the results are revealed at our ADDC Convention. The First-Place award is called an AIMEE and that stands for Achievement in Maintaining Energy Excellence.

Out of eight categories that we were entered in, we received first place in four categories, second place in three categories and third place in one category. That's eight out of eight that we placed in everything that we entered. Rena praised the membership and how the members work really hard to bring great programs and Field Trips and seminars. We encourage our members to attend all of these events including our Region Meetings and our ADDC Conventions to learn and appreciate our industry. Thank you all for making Wichita Falls stand out among the best.

Now is the time to get all the paperwork together to submit our entries for this coming year. If you have any favorites that you like, let Rena know on any category. She also needs photos, specifically industry-related photos, that you took within the year. Please send them to her the first week of December.

Since Tracy has officially been elected our 2025 President, she went over the various committees. Every table had copies of the Club's committees and what those committees do.

Earlier Rena mentioned committee files. Every committee Chair keeps a set of records/books/files, which contain correspondence, notes, invoices and emails, etc., that they worked on during the year, so the next year, 2025, those files or books go to the next Committee Chair. You are never left completely in the dark as far as what you need to do in your committee. And if you get stuck or have some questions, there are always a lot of people in the club that have been on that committee before that will help you just pick up the phone or shoot them an email. This is really a club effort.

- 1) **Budget & Finance**. We have to operate within a budget. The Committee may meet in person at the beginning of the year, to get everything organized. The committee members also include the President and Treasurer. We want to make sure we have enough money and start allocating expenses for Regional meetings and ADDC Convention to send the delegate and alternate to. If North Texas Association of Petroleum Landman and SPE have a golf tournament, we help with those. We make money from those. If Texas Alliance of Energy Producers is coming to Wichita Falls, we may be working a booth. Currently Diana is our Committee Chair. She has a spreadsheet, which will give you a starting point, look at what the different costs might be. One of them will be the increase in meal costs.
- 2)Bulletin. Every month we get a Bulletin. It includes monthly meeting notices, information on new members, reports, Field Trips, that type of stuff. If you are creative, that's a good place to channel your energy so all the news that we need to know is sent to us once a month. It's a very important but fun part of our club and the Bulletin committee doesn't really need to meet in person. They can do all their correspondence via e-mail or phone calls.
- 3) Bylaws. We have a really nice set of rules or Bylaws that we follow. If there's any changes to the Bylaws, the Bylaws Chair takes care of that. For example, in this current year with ADDC raising their dues, we have had no choice but to change the Bylaws to reflect that. It doesn't mean that you have to rewrite the Bylaws. You're literally just changing one sentence, and that's often the case. Now if you, as the Bylaws Chair, decide that you want to really revamp something, you can't just do that, but you can bring those ideas to the Board and go from there. The Bylaws Committee is an easy place to start because the Bylaws are already done. The Bylaws were reviewed this year. When ADDC changed the cost of dues, our Bylaws changed as well.
- 4)Education Committee. Education Committee works with seminars and contacts Midwestern State to inform them what we will be giving in scholarship money and how many scholarships we want to provide. They come back with the people that they feel would benefit and qualify for those scholarships.

For our newer members, prior to COVID, we had MOLU come to Wichita Falls several years and MOLU is Mobile Oilfield Learning Unit, which is a set of six modules that goes to elementary schools. It's really a learning process and there's questionnaires and it's all based on the energy industry, so the

Education Department has been the one that has contacted MOLU. Tracy isn't sure if MOLU is still in existence. A few years ago, the Texas Oil and Gas Association teamed up with the Oil Field Energy Center to work with MOLU, but that was in 2020. On a side note, if you happen to go to Galveston, just for vacation, either with the kids, grandkids, or just yourself, visit the Ocean Star Museum. It's a retired drilling rig that operated in the Gulf of Mexico. It's been refurbished and it's now a museum, but it is extremely interesting.

Also, for several years Region 9 has hosted a Texas Living History Day for fourth graders from a lot of the smaller surrounding schools. They probably don't really have the funding to do a lot of Field Trips, and they're too small to go too far. We would go to Region 9 and set up in a room with a bunch of our displays. The 80 or so kids attending would rotate from room to room. We had pictures on the wall and different items that are made with petroleum by-products. We want them to know how important our industry is to everyday life. We don't know yet if Region 9 will be doing that in 2025, but it's a lot of fun interacting with these kids.

You probably already know we donate to Project Back to School. We have had a booth in the past, which was not beneficial It's more beneficial to support them with a donation, if the budget allows.

- 5) Field Trip. Sheila and Cecil have agreed to Co-Chair our Field Trip Committee. If you have any ideas that you want to suggest to them or still want to be on the committee, you are welcome to do so. The Field Trip Committee really does take care of all of the planning. They figured out where we could go. How are we going to get there? When are we leaving? How much is going to cost? What time will we get back? Are there any safety requirements? Do you need to have steel toe shoes? We've had some great Field Trips, so they are always a lot of fun.
- 6) General Arrangements. General Arrangements is basically this right here. Where do we meet each month? How many seats do we need? Are we having our December meeting in the evening? We need a bigger venue for our October Industry Appreciation Lunch. Those types of things. Debbie has agreed to be the General Arrangements Committee Chair again this year, but if you want to help her with that, she would appreciate it.
- 7)Tracy's favorite, the **Golf Tournament.** Vickie and Tracy have Chaired this for the past few years. The location and the date are set for 2025. We do that when we leave the golf course after the tournament in May. Vickie has agreed to help out whoever is going to be on this committee with her. What Tracy has done is been the person that keeps track of everything on the sponsorships that come in, the teams that are registering, making sure they've paid or need to pay. The form that we send out to everybody has already been created. You just change the date, or any information needed. We can help with getting you addresses for sponsors and the team form is already basically done. Instead of finding sponsor for or buying door prizes, Vickie and Tracy went with the cash route. We have our notes on how much you need based on how many teams you have. If we had two flights, there was first, second and third places in both flights and those guys are always really happy when they win. So again, a lot of this is kind of set in motion for you, but somebody needs to kind of be the gatekeeper, keep track of everything.
- 8) Membership. Tracy is looking for someone right now. The Membership Committee doesn't need to meet in person. 

#### 'Tis the season for all things seasonal!

No, seriously...are you tired of listening to Christmas music at work, in your car, and in all the stores yet?

Regardless of whether you're a *there's no such thing as too much Christmas cheer* kind of person, or a *bah humbug* kind of person, you have to admit that there's just something...different about this time of year. I mean, nobody's out there recording entire albums with songs about any of the other Federal Holidays (I'm specifically looking at you, third Monday in February aka George Washington's Birthday).



## Perhaps one of the biggest components of the holiday season (besides all the cookies, of course) is all the Christmas lights.

Again, even if you're a bit of a Scrooge, you have to at least recognize that Christmas lights are kind of a big deal this time of year.

#### **History of Christmas Lights**

The history of Christmas lights dates back to before electrical lights were even invented. In early modern Germany, upper-class Christians used to decorate their Christmas trees with candles. Early electric Christmas lights were introduced in the 1880s with the introduction of electrification.

Come the early 20th century, it became popular to decorate publicly-displayed Christmas trees with electric lights. By the mid-20th century, it started to become popular to use electric lights to decorate *beyond* the tree; it became customary to string lights along streets and on buildings. Beginning in the 1960s, in the US it became popular to outline private houses with lights. By the end of the 20th century, this custom became popular in non-western countries and regions, as well.

Today, Christmas lights remain a very popular holiday decoration (for more than just Christmas, too). And as holiday light technology continues to develop, the possibilities for decorating are endless.



#### **Technology**

Christmas lights (also called twinkle lights, holiday lights, mini lights, or fairy lights), are, at their simplest, lights on string (wire), which is why they're also sometimes simply referred to as "string lights." But they've gotten much more complex than that...you can not get everything from battery-operated string lights to illuminate animatronics. Want your entire house to glow in turn with some of you favorite holiday jams? Yeah, you can have that, too.

Suffice it to say, we've come quite a long way from sticking lit candles on live trees (which frankly doesn't sound so safe). To go our popular fire-retardant artificial Christmas trees, technology has also provided us with a better choice in light bulb: LED.

Though types of light bulbs vary across Christmas décor, incandescent bulbs were a very popular choice. However, light-emitting diodes (LEDs) are becoming increasingly popular (and encouraged) as they are more energy efficient. They also are considered a safer alternative as they don't heat up like traditional light bulbs.

#### **LEDs**

Unlike light bulbs (which generate light because of heat generation), LEDs emit light by electronic excitation. While their popularity in Christmas decorating might be *modern*, LEDs have actually been around for quite some time; in 1950s it was discovered that some of the materials could generate light and in 1960 Researchers at AT&T Bell Laboratories began to exploit the light-generating properties of such materials.

Some of the components within LEDs include diodes (made from thin layers of semiconductor material "wafers", which are rather complex); wires; and transparent plastic which encases the LEDs. The plastic can be a number of varieties (although all are made from petroleum), and the type of plastic used will determine what the LED output looks like.

And when it comes to strings of LED Christmas lights, the wires are coated with Polyvinyl chloride (PVC), which is, again, a petroleum product.

#### **HUGHES COMPANY "CHRISTMAS TREE" OIL FIELD TOOL**

#### A festive design to control the flow of oil

Don't expect presents under this Christmas tree, unless oil is on your wish list. Named for its resemblance to the popular evergreen, an oil field "Christmas tree" is an assembly of valves, spools, and fittings used to regulate the flow of gas or oil out of the well, release well pressure, and inject chemicals that prevent production problems like blockages. Christmas trees provide more control over when and how much a well produces, increasing its efficiency and significantly reducing blowouts and related fires. This Christmas tree was manufactured in the 1930s by the Hughes Company—originally Sharp-Hughes Tool Company—which was established in 1909 in Houston by Howard Hughes, Sr.

# Candy Canes: A Festive Treat with a Fossil Fuel Twist

Christmas is here and I love this time of year! I love the lights, the sounds, all the smells of Christmas, and, yes, the taste of candy canes. I also love decorating the house and shopping to find just the perfect gift for my grandkids and family. In decorating the tree, I have my favorite ornaments and I always finish the tree with candy canes. I will usually put a few in everyone's stockings, use them for decorations, tie one or two to a gift bag for friends, or enjoy as a sweet treat.



We all love candy canes. One of my favorite Christmas movies is "Elf", where we hear Will Ferrell's Buddy the Elf say "We elves try to stick to the four main food groups: candy, candy canes, candy corn and syrup." Awesome movie, be sure to add it to your list of holiday favorites.

But, have you every thought about the history of the candy cane? Well, I hope you are sitting down for this one, but a candy cane is actually made from *petroleum*. Does that blow your mind a little bit? It did mine! But, it's true!

#### **History of the Candy Cane**

The candy cane is a cane-shaped stick candy often associated with Christmas. It is traditionally white with red stripes and flavored with peppermint, but the canes also come in a variety of other flavors and colors.

Just like the Christmas tradition of decorating a tree, the Christmas Candy Cane originated in Germany. It was originally a plain white sugar stick.

According to history, the familiar white sugar stick goes back to 1670. The choirmaster at the Cologne Cathedral in Germany would give the sugar-sticks to the fidgety children to keep them quiet during the Christmas services. In honor of the occasion, he bent the candies into shepherd's crooks.

The clergymen's custom of handing out candy canes during Christmas services would eventually spread throughout Europe and later to America. At the time, the canes were still white, but sometimes the candy-makers would add sugar-roses to decorate the canes. In 1847, the first historical reference to the candy cane in America appeared when a German immigrant named August Imgard decorated the Christmas tree in his Wooster, Ohio home with candy canes.

In 1919, a candy maker named Bob McCormack began making candy canes. And by the middle of the century, his company, Bob's Candies, became widely famous for their candy canes. Initially, the canes had to be bent by hand to make the "J" shape. That changed with the help of his brother-in-law, Gregory Keller, who invented the machine to automate candy cane production.

#### So, Are you asking yourself...Where's the petroleum?

In the red dye! The red coloring in candy canes usually comes from Red 40, which has been deemed safe by the FDA. Though it comes from petroleum distillates, it has been closely tested to ensure that the final product is safe for consumption. You will also find that the wrappers and packaging for candy canes are often made from petroleum-based plastics. This includes materials like polyethylene and polypropylene, which are commonly used in food packaging. The machinery and equipment used in the manufacturing of candy canes may be lubricated or constructed from materials that are derived from petroleum.

#### **Legend of the Candy Cane**

It has been claimed that the cane was shaped like a "J" for "Jesus" or a shepherd's crook and that the red-and-white stripes represented Christ's blood and purity. The three red stripes

were also said to symbolize the Holy Trinity and the hardness of the candy represented the Church's foundation on solid rock. As for the candy cane's peppermint flavor, it represented the use of hyssop, a herb referred to in the Old Testament. There is no historical evidence to support these claims, but it is fun to view them in this manner.

So, as you sit by the fire this holiday season with a candy cane in hand, remember to say "thank you" to the petroleum industry for those delicious treats!

#### Trump's nominees bring experience to energy issues

America's energy policy is in for a major overhaul.

President-elect Trump announced this week the appointment of two key members to his cabinet relating to energy issues. North Dakota Governor Doug Burgum will serve as Secretary of Interior and Colorado businessman Christopher Wright was nominated as Secretary of Energy. Both must be confirmed by the Senate.

Burgum also will serve as the chair of the new National Energy Council, which will consist of all departments and agencies involved in the permitting, production, generation, distribution, regulation, transportation, of all forms of American energy, and will therefore have a seat on the National Security Council, Trump said,

The National Energy Council will coordination among federal agencies to advance American energy. "By establishing U.S. energy dominance, we can jumpstart our economy, drive down costs for consumers and generate billions in revenue to help reduce our deficit," Burgum said.

Before entering politics, Burgum headed a software company, which was acquired by Microsoft in 2001 and has been in a variety of businesses until he was elected Governor in 2016.

Burgum ran for President but failed to gather enough support and closed his campaign in December 2023.

North Dakota is the third largest oil producing state behind Texas and New Mexico.

Christopher Wright is CEO of Liberty Energy, an oil field service company based in Colorado but operates throughout the nation especially in Texas and North Dakota.

Wright founded Pinnacle Technologies in 1992 during the very early days of the new technology entering the exploration of oil and natural gas through fracturing. He later formed Liberty Resources, an exploration and production company operating in North Dakota, which led to Liberty Energy.

Liberty Energy had \$4 billion in annual revenues last year. It is a publicly traded company at \$17 per share on Nov. 18 with a market cap of around \$3 billion.
